## Traditional egg painting classes held in Teulon







The Green Acres Art Centre held three pysanky workshops last week for those wanting to learn the art of Ukrainian Easter egg painting. Pysanky is an old-fashioned method of egg decorating using melted beeswax through a stylus called a kistka. The wax is applied to the egg, sealing that area from the dye and keeping it white. The egg is dyed, and more wax is applied. This process continues, progressing from light to dark-coloured dyes, and then the wax is removed by heating the egg and gently wiping off the melted wax. Each egg becomes a unique piece of art once the wax has been removed. ## Rockwood council news in brief

The South Interlake ATV club asked the RM of Rockwood to help by providing grading of the Interlake Pioneer Trail. In addition, the club asked the municipality for extra gravel or fill, if there's any available.

During the March 13 meeting, council defeated a resolution to donate the

grading equipment, extra gravel and fill.

At the same meeting, council passed a resolution to execute agreements among the RMs of Rockwood, Armstrong and Woodlands as well as Neicom and Interlake Pioneer Trail to operate and manage the trail.

## IN OTHER COUNCIL NEWS:

- Council authorized bylaw compliance for an unsightly yard in Stony Mountain.
- The RM of Rockwood has set the 2024 price for dust control at \$535 per 100-metre site. After that, the cost is \$5.35 per metre.
- The RM of Rockwood will donate a silent auction prize to Madeline's Closet Inc. for its Annual Summertime Jamboree on June 15.
- Council unanimously passed second and third readings of a bylaw

to renew the municipality's annual line of credit.

- Council accepted a levy increase for the 2024 budget for Rockwood-Woodlands bylaw enforcement and animal control. The municipality will pay this year's levy of \$50,000.
- Council conditionally approved a request to relocate from homeowners to relocate their older residence from Harstone Road in Winnipeg to Norris Lake Road South. South Interlake Planning District noted that the home, which was built in 1959, is in generally very good used condition. SIPD provided several recommendations for the move as well as for upgrades once the home is in its new location.



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## Local students participate in leadership events

High school students from across the division got a crash course on leadership during an inspirational conference last week.

It all began in the fall when three students from each of Interlake School Division's high schools — Collège Stonewall Collegiate, Warren Collegiate and Teulon Collegiate — attended a five-day Canadian Student Leadership Conference in New Brunswick.

Four staff members also attended the conference — Curtis Grieve and Deanna Johnson from Collège Stonewall Collegiate, Fallon Campbell from Warren Collegiate and Chelsea Meier from Teulon Collegiate.

For Grieve, it was clear to see the positive impact of the Canada-wide conference at the local level.

"It was a good learning opportunity for the students and advisors. The benefit after you run these sort of events is you see energy. Being around other students that have a similar passion, it ignites a fire in the belly of your own students," he said.

"Then those students are able to transfer that information to other students in your leadership group and other students in your high school. It's a way to get more people involved."

The nine Interlake School Division students who attended the Canadian Student Leadership conference spearheaded several local events last week, with support from the four staff members who joined them in New Bruns-

On Monday, March 18, students from all three high schools had the chance to hear motivational speaker Ian Tyson speak at Collège Stonewall Collegiate.

Then on Tuesday, students gathered at the Heritage Arts Centre for the Horizons Leadership Conference, which provides motivation, inspiration and information to the school community.

The event featured the motivational messages of both Ian Tyson and Jermaine Frazer.

"Ian Tyson has been a professional speaker since 1989 and he performs for tens of thousands of people each year. He is very well-known in the Canadian student leadership world. He has spoken at the Canadian Student Leadership Conference, many Horizon events, as well touring across the country each year," she said.

many things that students could possibly add to their school or add into their leadership team."


The goal of these events is to share experiences with other students about what it means to be a leader in school, she added.

The community is banding together to support a family after their home in Inwood was destroyed by a fire two weeks ago.

Inwood Fire Department received the call late in the afternoon on Thursday, March 14. Fraserwood Fire Department assisted with the call.

"It was basically fully engulfed when we got there, unfortunately," said Inwood Fire Chief Kyle Hazelton.

Jennifer and Scott Hanson and their family lost their home and all their belongings in the blaze, but everyone is safe and there were no major injuries. They have three daughters, with two of them still living at home.

"The community has been very supportive," Jennifer Hanson said. "Our

work has been really supportive too."
She also acknowledged Teulon
Coun. Kirt Ansell and Madeline's
Closet founder Shannon Dupont,
who reached out to them soon after

The family is currently working with their insurance company to sort out the next steps. In the meantime, they would gratefully accept food items. Jennifer said food could be dropped off at Vidir at 379 1st St. in Teulon, where she and Scott both work.

In addition, a friend set up a Go-FundMe page called "Scott and Jennie Hanson's House Fire Relief" for anyone who would like to contribute.

Inwood Fire Department didn't have any information about the cause of the fire.

## RM of Rosser ends 2023 with a surplus

The City of Winnipeg's water and waste department has submitted a proposal to operate a biosolids field storage and land application program in the RM of Rosser once again this year. This program has taken place in various areas of Rosser since 2018.

This year's request would span a total of 1,515 acres, with portions divided among Rutherford Farms, Oatway Farms and Braun Grain Farm.

The city's proposal includes transportation management requirements

including specified haul routes, maximum tonnage and restricted speed limits.

Rosser council conditionally approved the request. One of the conditions is that the City of Winnipeg will be responsible for all costs related to road, ditch and drainage upgrades, as well as maintenance, dust control and restoration of municipal property. The city will also need to inform all residents within 0.8 kilometres of each program site.

In other Rosser council news:

- The RM of Rosser will donate \$10,000 to the STARS Foundation for the Night with STARS Gala fundraiser sponsorship.
- The RM also donated \$200 worth of gift cards to the Stony On Ice skating competition, which they Stony Mountain Skating Club ran from March 22 to 24.
- Council approved a three per cent wage adjustment for all eligible employees for 2024. The adjustment

will be retroactive to Jan. 1, 2024.

- Council conditionally approved a request to authorize a 1,000-square-foot secondary suite attached to a new 1,250-square-foot garage/workshop. One of the conditions is that the secondary suite can only be leased to a first- or second-degree relative of the property owner. First-degree relatives are parents, siblings and children. Second-degree relatives are nieces and nephews, grandparents, grandchildren, aunts and uncles. A maximum of four people can live in the secondary suite.
- Council defeated a request to vary the distance between a detached secondary suite and the main dwelling from 50 feet to 280 feet.
- Council conditionally approved a request to authorize a private vehicle collection on a Rosser property. The maximum vehicles permitted on the site will be 250, including personal vehicles. The vehicle collection must be reasonably obstructed from the general public's view and

from neighbours' view.

- Council conditionally approved a request to authorize the intensification of a farm operation at Sturgeon Creek Colony. The intensification over the next several years would include a new boiler and biomass storage building, new welding shop, new residential buildings and agricultural and farm buildings.
- Council authorized the purchase of a 2024 CAT grader from Toromont CAT.
- The RM of Rosser ended 2023 with a surplus. Council approved a transfer of \$225,000 to the machinery replacement reserve to replace aging equipment as needed, \$105,000 to the fire reserve for the future purchase of firefighting equipment and \$25,000 to the office reserve to use toward the future expansion of the municipal office.
- The RM of Rosser will host its 2024 financial plan public hearing on Tuesday, April 23 at 7 p.m. at the municipal office.

## **Health foundation funds** transferred to ICF


The Stonewall and District Health Centre Foundation Inc. recently wrapped up their operations, transferring a total of \$455,461.51 in funds to the Interlake Community Foundation.

The Health Centre Foundation was established in 1996 for the purpose of collecting donations and distributing them to community and facility-based health initiatives. The board membership included appointees from the Town of Stonewall and RMs of Rockwood, Rosser and Woodlands.

Throughout the years, donations have been utilized to provide equipment and

furnishings for both the Stonewall and District Health Centre and Rosewood Lodge Personal Care Home.

ICF has set up two funds — one for potential funding of the planned personal care home facility in Stonewall and another for the purchase of necessary equipment, furnishings and items for the well-being of patients and residents at the Stonewall and District Health Centre and Rosewood Lodge Personal Care Home. The specific needs have been determined by staff in Stonewall and the local IERHA administration, with a spending period of four years.

## **Cinnamon Brown Sugar Loaf**



Recipe courtesy of "Cookin' Savvy'

Medium bowl Warm water

Sourdough starter Salt

Unbleached all-purpose flour

Silicone spoon Softened butter

Brown sugar Cinnamon Sharp knife

In medium bowl, combine 330 grams warm water, 90 grams sourdough starter and 10 grams salt. Stir well then add 525 grams flour. Using silicone spoon, mix dough to sticky ball. Let rest, covered, about 45 minutes.

Pull dough from bottom and stretch to top of dough ball. Repeat around entirety of dough ball a few times then cover. Repeat process four times then cover and let sit at room temperature at least 6 hours but no more than 14 hours. Dough should double.

In bowl, mix 4 tablespoons butter, 1/2cup brown sugar and 2 tablespoons

Sprinkle flour on counter then spread

dough flat on floured surface. Spread cinnamon mixture on dough. Fold dough from sides, pinching to keep cinnamon inside, then turn and roll into ball. Place on parchment paper and put back in bowl 1 hour.

Heat oven to 475 F with uncovered Dutch oven inside.

Using sharp knife, score dough then place parchment paper and dough in Dutch oven lined with aluminum foil. Cover with lid and bake 20 minutes then remove lid and lower temperature to 450 F for 25 minutes. Internal temperature should reach 195-205 F. Let rest at least 1 hour before cutting and

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## Nurse practitioner float pool increases access to care

With a dedication to health and well-being, nurse practitioners help to increase access to care while addressing health inequities in some communities across the region.

Nurse practitioners are registered nurses with advanced education at the master's level. This advanced education provides them with knowledge and skills to screen for illness, diagnose, prescribe and manage patient care as a sole practitioner or as part of a multidisciplinary team.

Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority currently employs 26 nurse practitioners, including full-time and part-time positions. In addition, the health authority recently launched a casual nurse practitioner float pool to help bridge gaps in communities where there are vacancies for primary care providers.

Nurse practitioners in the float pool are flexible in their assignments. They can "float" or move between different geographic areas, health centres and primary care clinics within the Interlake-Eastern region. This flexibility is especially valuable in settings where patient needs are high and access to primary care providers is limited.

The float pool recruits nurse practitioners with varied career backgrounds, including some with experience working in northern First Nations and for tribal councils.

Ann Nzereum works for Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority and Southeast Resource Development Council, which provides health care and other services to eight First Nations. She's a nurse practitioner who has been involved with the float pool for about eight months.

As a result, Nzereum has worked in multiple different settings, including Ashern, Eriksdale Primary Care,

Pinaymootang Health Centre, Pine Falls Primary Care Clinic, Black River Health Centre and Hollow Water Health Centre.

"The nurse practitioner float pool model allows health-care organizations to optimize their workforce, ensuring they can provide quality care across different geographical locations. In regions where there may be shortages of health-care professionals in specific specialties or units, a float pool can help address staffing gaps and ensure that patient care needs are met," she said.

"Float nurse practitioners contribute to maintaining and improving the quality of patient care by applying their skills across various clinical

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areas and adhering to best practices in each specialty. Their ability to integrate into different health-care teams enhances collaboration and communication skills since they work with diverse groups of professionals."

Providing virtual care is also part of this model, offering a flexible way to ensure health-care providers are available when and where they are most needed.

To start, the client makes an appointment to visit a health-care centre or clinic. When they arrive, they're checked into a consultation room where a computer is set up with Microsoft Teams. The client receives an explanation of how the appointment will work followed by a virtual introduction to the nurse practitioner. The clinic's administrative assistants will print any required paperwork, such as lab requisitions, and provide it to the patient after the appointment

As a nurse practitioner in the float pool, Nzereum appreciates how the opportunity has bolstered her skills and versatility.

"I enjoy the exposure to different clinical settings and specialties. I also like that I have a flexible schedule and a dynamic work environment," she said. "I have been able to develop strong problem-solving skills given that I have to deal with different patient populations and clinical scenarios."

The health authority continues to recruit health-care workers, including casual nurse practitioners to join the float pool. From April 1 to Dec. 31, 2023, the nurse practitioner float pool provided 57 days of service, and it's currently being expanded to provide more services.



## Crime Stoppers Stonewall looking for volunteer members

Do you have information that could help to solve a crime that occurred in rural Manitoba?

Stonewall council heard a presentation from Mike Bernard on behalf of Manitoba Crime Stoppers, which asks for the public's help to solve crimes.

Since the non-profit organization launched in July 1985, Manitoba Crime Stoppers has received 16,101 tips on criminal activities across the province, including in rural Manitoba

Crime Stoppers accepts anonymous tips online at www.manitobacrimestoppers.com or though its online toll-free tip line at 1-800-222-8477, which is available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. For emergencies, be sure to call 911. Tips submitted through the website are encrypted, and the phone line doesn't have call display and is not traceable.

The organization offers cash awards of up to \$2,000 if the tip leads to an arrest, charges or the recovery of stolen property or illegal drugs. All costs for reward money come from fundraising and donations since Crime Stoppers doesn't receive government funding.

Tipsters never have to give personal information, never have to identify themselves, never have to appear in court and will not be required to give a statement to police. Crime Stoppers provides all information to local police authorities.

To date, Manitoba Crime Stoppers has approved \$232,088 in cash awards. Tips have helped in 2,216 arrests and 2,306 cases being cleared.



Thanks to information from tipsters, police have seized \$34 million worth of drugs and recovered \$8.6 million worth of stolen property. In addition, more than 41 weapons and eight vehicles have been recovered.

Crime Stoppers is also involved in a project to supply signage to communities to let people how to submit anonymous tips. The first set of signs is free. Crime Stopper's board of directors provided input on the project, along with the Association of Manitoba Municipalities and the RCMP. The Town of Stonewall has received its first set of signs from Crime Stoppers and has also ordered a second set. Once all the signs are received, they will be installed at all the major entrances and exits to town.

Since some of the festivities will take place on Main Street, the Town of Council will close Main Street from 2nd Avenue North to 3rd Avenue South on Aug. 14 at 8 a.m. and will reopen it on Sunday, Aug. 18 at 10 p.m.

• Stonewall and Area Mobility

Services (SAMS) is converting part of its fleet to green energy, and part of the project includes establishing a vehicle charging station network. SAMS went through a formal procurement process and has selected a firm to supply these charging stations. Part of the conditions of a government-funding program is a requirement that a municipality be the main contact for the funding agent, and Stonewall will be

Hunters who grew up attending events with their parents have recently stepped into leadership roles, driving the recovery of the club. Their dedication to youth hunting and conservation efforts is paving the way for the future of the association.

Last Saturday marked a special occasion for the Woodlands & District Wildlife Association as they revived the popular awards banquet. The Woodlands Community Hall was adorned with a display of antlers and head mounts — each telling its own unique story of adventure and skill.

Attendees indulged in a delicious meal catered by Burnside BBQ and took part in fundraising raffles, a variety auction and 50/50 draw.

Following dinner, hunters were recognized for their achievements in various categories. Hailey Hueging stood out in the women's division with her typical deer scoring 147 1/8, securing first place. Robyn Yanke earned second place with a score of 135 3/8.

In the men's category, Colton King received first place for his muzzleloader whitetail with a score of 118 4/8. Meanwhile, Colton Green claimed first place in the whitetail rifle division for his deer that scored 141 7/8. Darrell Hueging came in a close second with a score of 140 4/8.

The men's moose typical category saw a shared victory among brothers Colton, Trey and Karson King as they all received recognition for their moose that scored 144 4/8.

The Woodlands & District Wildlife Association is gearing up for an exciting year ahead with a lineup of events catered to both seasoned hunters and newcomers alike — from the ever-popular youth waterfowl shoot in the fall to hunter's safety and PAL courses.

Memberships are encouraged as they not only grant access to these events but also enable participants to submit entries for recognition at the 2024 awards banquet. With categories in archery, muzzleloader and rifle for various game, including deer, elk, moose, caribou and bear. For junior hunters, special categories exist in archery, muzzleloader and rifle.

Additionally, there is an award for the recipient of the highest score in walleye, perch and pike fishing. To enter, send in a photo of your catch against a measuring tape of all three

## Snowmobile will be the talk of the trail

An old snowmobile is destined to become the talk of the trail among sled enthusiasts and historians once it's buffed up a bit and put on display at the Gimli Snowmobile Centre.

The 1961 Ski-Doo, which was nicknamed the "tin cab," was a prized possession of a Berens River First Nation family who sold it to the recreational sports dealership.

Gimli Snowmobile Centre owners Dennis Vigfusson and his sister Sheila Cowell bought the early Ski-Doo prototype after members of Berens River family contacted them and said they wanted to find the sled a good home.

"The [man] contacted me saying he had an older snowmobile and that he wanted to find a good home for it, somewhere it would be appreciated. The family could no longer store it,"

said Vigfusson. "And we purchased it from them for our collection."

Made by Canadian manufacturer Bombardier (now Bombardier Recreational Products), the 1961 Ski-Doo is an early snowmobile prototype, along the lines of the first car manufactured for the market by Ford in the

early years of the 20th century, said Vigfusson. Bombardier made its first production Ski-Doo in 1959. The company manufactured more Ski-Doos in 1960 and 1961, enabling people to gain access to a variety of wintery terrain. The sled proved so popular that its name became a verb.

The cab or hood covering the engine is made out of metal, hence its nickname tin cab, said Vigfusson. The original owner of the 1961 machine modified it slightly by building a box under the seat in which he could carry a hunting rifle.

"It's very interesting to see these old machines. And this one belonged to only one person; he bought it brand new and kept it all these years," he said.

The Gimli Snowmobile Centre is a Bombardier Recreational Products dealer. The dealership carries both winter and summer recreational brand-name products such as Ski-Doo and Sea-Doo (watercraft) machines, Lynx (snowmobiles) and Can-Am ATVs and side-by-sides. In addition to a wide variety of products, the dealership carries parts, apparel and accessories and offers services such as oil and filter changes and engine rebuilds.

Currently, their snowmobiles are flying out the door.

"Our phone has been ringing off the hook. About 90-plus per cent of our snowmobiles have been pre-sold already for the entire winter here. We're

in panic mode trying to get the snow-mobiles out the door. We have 160-plus machines we're moving," said Vigfusson.

Vigfusson said the 1961 Ski-Doo is in "running condition" and came with two engines — the original and an upgraded engine. It runs nowhere near as fast as today's sleds go. He'll be installing the original engine in the sled before putting it on display at the dealership. Customers won't be able to take it for a spin.

"This sled will be for display purposes only and maybe it might spark some interest in snowmobiling. There are a lot of snowmobile collectors out there that like to see this old stuff, the same way vintage car collectors do. There are a lot of people who want to see a tin cab snowmobile and have a big interest in them," said Vigfusson. "It's a conversation piece to showcase the business. To get something like

## Collision on Highway 7 sends two to hospital

A community-minded local businessman is counting his blessings after walking away from a highway collision last week.

On Thursday, March 21 at 9:49 a.m., Stonewall RCMP received a call about a highway collision south of Stony Mountain on Highway 7.

Danny Kleinsasser of Danny's Whole Hog had been driving westbound on Road 74N when he pulled out onto Highway 7. A southbound semi struck the passenger side of Kleinsasser's vehicle. The 52-year-old semi driver, who is from Winnipeg, was taken to hospital with injuries.

Kleinsasser was also taken to hospital and released the same night. Soon after, he posted photos on Facebook that he took of the accident, along with a heartfelt message.

"I'm alive, Thank God for the miracle. I'm at home. 3 Broken ribs. Broken sternum. Don't blame the Trucker, it was my fault. He is all right. I talked to him. He put this own life in danger by swerving to hit me in the motor to have less impact," Kleinsasser wrote.

"He had a 120000 pounds of gravel on his load. I walked away from that vehicle by myself. Thanks for all the messages and caring. Thank God for another day."

On Monday, Kleinsasser told the Tribune he felt stiff for the first three days, but he's feeling better after a good rest.

"It's a miracle. I'm counting my blessings, that's for sure. I'm holding my family close to me and my staff and my friends. The outreach that I've got is unbelievable. I've probably had over 1,000 messages," he said.

"I went back to the crash site this morning just to see. I needed to do it."

Kleinsasser said he drives that route each day, and usually he has his dog with him. The morning of the accident, he went out the side door of his



business after speaking with an employee and left his dog behind.

"He wouldn't have survived it. There was only one area left in the vehicle where I was sitting," he said.

"At 62 years, it's a blink of an eye and you could be gone. I'm a man of faith, and I know God gave me anoth-

Kleinsasser's first grandchild was born in January, and he's grateful for the chance to be part of her life.

"She's going to see another day of me. I'll be able to hold her tight," he

"It could've been all over, but I walked away from it. It gives you a different perspective on life. It makes you think. Hug your loved ones tight. It's a blessing that I'm alive and I have the angels beside me. I'm going to keep bringing the flavour to my family and to everybody."

Stonewall RCMP said no alcohol or drugs were involved and an investigation is ongoing.

He had Rheumatic fever at age 12, then again at age 20, severely damaging his heart. Doctors first said he wouldn't see age 13, never mind 21. He lived 70 plus wonderful years past their guesses. Even a death sentence of less than 6 months with metastatic melanoma couldn't take him down 6 1/2 years ago. He beat cancer!

He loved farming, nature and his family. He was a man of great integrity. He would lend a helping hand in an instant. He could debate a topic as a gentleman should. He always listened to the other person's side of the issue without degradation, interruption, or harsh comments. Then he would

state his side of the story, and a former Stonewall lawyer said he respected John for that ability. He often swayed other's opinions to his side but left amicably if they couldn't reach an agreement.

He loved farming. BSE broke his heart and then, later, not being able to participate in active farming. In its place, he loved picking up Doug Freeman (nephew) from next door with his side by side and driving out to the northeast pasture to check the cattle, hoeing their immaculate acre of garden or just puttering around in the shop. He put on over 30,000 km on his side by side. It became his mobility. You'd see him going down the road, cowboy hat on; happy to check out the cattle, pastures and ditches for ducks and fish.

Dad met Mom, Helene Tesar, at friend and neighbour's Annie Tomyk's. He was driving the milk truck for Rockwood Victoria Coop at that time. From that moment on he wanted a good job so when he died young, Mom would have a pension to look after her. He applied to the Winnipeg Police but they told him he would have to lose 40 pounds. "Well that wasn't going to happen," he said. Dad was always a big, big man. So the gentleman told Dad that if he was serious and a hard worker, Headingley Gaol was hiring. Dad went out there that day and he started the very next. This was a few months before Mom and Dad married.

He spent the first 7 1/2 years as a guard walking the floor around the cages. Then he was moved to the Farm for eight years. When on the farm he had his own gang (31 men) to take outside. They cut wood, hoed the large field gardens and even worked on the highway/ditches out to Brandon. He never had a convict escape while they were out. He was even given other guard's gangs to supervise.

He later was moved to the Bursar's office in accounting. He ordered the supplies for the institution, handled the inmates pay, and their canteen, along with various other duties. He developed the sports programs and the handicraft department. Even then if there was a problem anywhere in the jail, he was called out of accounting to deal with it. He was great at mediation.

When he retired, Mom and him continued farming and working around the yard, with him hoeing a very large garden even in 2023. The garden and yard were always pristine. Food was also very important. He never lost his large appetite. He loved his French fries and fish down at the shop. A big thank you to niece Sherri Freeman for all her wonderful baking over the years. He always had plenty of goodies to choose from for coffee. A plate of potatoes was never spoiled either! Dad, MJ and Izabella said you could never ruin a potato or leave a spoonful behind, but you could ruin carrots.

Dad was born a twin on the home farm to parents Elizabeth and John. His twin didn't survive. He was predeceased by all his siblings, Bill, Bob, Isabell Martini and Jim. Dad and Mom were fortunate to live on the farm their whole lives. Dad and Mom had tragedy strike when their first born Lori died at 6 weeks of SIDS. Later Vera (George Appleyard) then John (MJ) completed the family. Soon grandchildren Matthew (Lucas, Athan, Izabella, Alma, Angel, Diego), Amber (Travis Lawrence, Rustyn Hayes), Mackenzie (Corrine) and lots of granddogs came along to join in the fun. Dad and Mom were together for over 65 years before Mom died in 2017.

He left a huge hole in all our lives. He is so sadly missed by his kids, grandkids, many nieces and nephews and wonderful friends.


A lifelong animal lover, Ken cherished moments with his dog, Duke, and delighted in the wildlife that frequented his farm.
