Two in the running for a seat on Teulon's town council

Teulon's byelection set for March 6 has two candidates in the running for the council seat.

Former mayor of Teulon, Bert Campbell, and entrepreneur Glenn Kletke are running for the position vacated by Ted Hodgkinson, who passed away late last year.

Bert Campbell has been a resident of Teulon virtually all his life.

He has been involved in the trucking industry for 55 years but recently retired from long haul trucking in November of 2022.

In 1998 Campbell became a councillor for the Town of Teulon and in 2002 he was elected Mayor and continued until the fall of 2018.

Campbell is no stranger to the goings on in the community. Over the years he has been involved with the Veselka Ukrainian Dance, hockey, ringette and has co-chaired the Teulon International Truck and Tractor Pull for over 40 years.

While on council for 20 years, Campbell experienced a lot of growth from the purchase and expansion of Crescent Creek Park to attracting Vidir Machine to town and to assisting Feather Industries to get Northern Goose up and running once again.

"Many homes were built thanks in part to a building incentive we established," said Campbell.


There are a number of concerns that he would like to address if he is elected as councillor.

"I feel some of the concerns in Town are the lack of any sidewalks in the North East part of Town. Also the lack of RCMP presence in town. I know the fact that the office closed here is something out of local control but a little more presence of officers on patrol would be a good thing," said

"Our health services took a big hit back in 2012 to 2015. We formed a Health Sustainability Committee in 2015 and with the cooperation of the IERHA and the Teulon Medical Clinic, a Primary Care Clinic was established. This clinic is being used as a model for the establishment of similar clinics in a number of communities to date. We believe it has made living in Teulon a lot more comfortable for many of our Residents."

Campbell is also concerned that business establishments in Teulon have become quite static in the last

"I would have to do some serious lobbying to get a few restaurants in town but more so to encourage other businesses to move to town and to provide employment for some resi-

dents right here in Teulon." Recreation is vital to any small town and should be encouraged along with assisted living.

My plan is to work hard for the people of Teulon as I did for 20 years I was in

Glenn Kletke has lived in the Teulon area for 61 years and graduated from Teulon Collegiate before attending Red River College. His working career

played out just a few short miles south of town. As an entrepreneur, he grew and expanded the successful family business, Kletke Seed Farm. He was nominated in 2017 as a finalist in the Western Canada EY Entrepreneur of the Year Awards, which seeks ambitious entrepreneurs who are building a more equitable, sustainable and prosperous world for all.

Kletke doesn't look as

work as work, but looks at it as daily challenges to overcome and believes anything is possible with a good team

Kletke has since sold the family business, moved into town and is now ready for life's new challenges.

"I'm not ready to retire just yet. If elected for council I will make it my new mission," said Kletke.

Kletke has been out knocking on doors in the community, re introducing himself and finding out what the community is looking for in a councillor.

"What I am hearing from the community is: that activities for children are important, somewhere they can play and be safe; taxes vs services; more usage of Teulon's amenities; aging citizens would like walkways improved; list of current activities/ functions available, things like pickle ball in elementary school; public opinion is our town is stagnant and needs progress."

Kletke feels these issues will be a team effort, and if elected will help prioritize and complete one task, then move on to the next from start to

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Public hearing focuses on Stony Mountain development proposal

A Rockwood business will be driving forward with plans to sell recreational vehicles.

At the Feb. 14 council meeting, Rockwood council approved a conditional use request to operate the business at two adjacent properties located just east of Stonewall on Road 8 East and Provincial Trunk Highway 7.

The applicants had previously been selling recreational vehicles from the property without conditional use approval. The landowner applied for conditional use to authorize the sale of these RVs.

Council conditionally approved the request. Conditions include a limit of daily operational hours from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., ensuring the premises are tidy and well-maintained, and obtaining any required permits, approvals or licences required by the provincial or federal governments. The applicant can display a maximum of three RVs at any one time in a designated display area. In addition, the applicant can store a maximum of 10 vehicles at any one time.

Council also approved a conditional use request from Parkdale Colony Holdings (Concord Colony Farms) to authorize the building of a 40,526-square-foot addition to an existing metal manufacturing development called KlarTech on a property at Provincial Road 220.

"KlarTech Inc. is an accessory manufacturing business located on Concord Colony Farms property. The applicant is proposing to expand the current manufacturing facility by doubling its current building footprint from 36,963 square feet to 77,500 square feet. According to the applicant, the existing manufacturing facility is a modern facility built with fabricated insulated concrete sandwich

panels and a steel truss roof that was completed in 2012," said Eric Shaw, general manager and development officer for South Interlake Planning District.

"The facility is located along the western edge of the Concord Colony Farms property, immediately east of PR 220. The proposed addition would utilize the same construction type (pre-cast concrete tilt up sandwich panel walls, concrete inside and outside with a layer of rigid insulation, and steel truss roof) as the current facility with upgrades to meet current energy codes. The building addition would be located on the north side of the existing facility."

The manufacturing site is located deep within Concord Colony, surrounded by farmland and vegetation. The nearest home on a separate land title is located about 2,625 feet to the north.

"The applicant states that the proposed addition would not adversely impact the surrounding development, including those on and adjacent to the

colony property," Shaw said.

"Specifically, no drainage, emissions, noise, traffic or dust impacts are anticipated."

The applicant must adhere to conditions that include obtaining all required permits from South Interlake Planning District, the RM of Rockwood and the provincial and federal governments. The principal use of the site must be an active agricultural operation, and no subdivision of the site will be permitted. Daily hours of operation will be limited to 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on weekdays and 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturdays.

In addition, council approved a conditional use request for a 1,232-squarefoot temporary mobile home on a property on Meridian Road east of the municipal boundary between the RMs of Rockwood and Woodlands.

The family has worked on this farm for generations and want to continue farming.

"According to the applicant, having

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
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

a mobile home on the farmyard will provide added security during nonwork hours and allow their grandfather to stay in his house longer without feeling the need to move off the farm to make room for the next generation. The applicant intends to reside in the proposed temporary mobile home, while their grandfather will continue to occupy the principal dwelling," Shaw said.

"The applicant believes there will be no environmental concerns with regards to smoke, emissions, noise, traffic, dust and vibrations, and that it will fit into the context of the surrounding area with minimal impact."

South Interlake Planning District had no significant concerns, and council conditionally approved the request.

A small crowd gathered in the RM of Rockwood council chambers for a public hearing related to Mountain Ridge Park Development's proposed subdivision of a 22-acre property in Stony Mountain to create 34 residential lots as well as a public road, public reserve and a residual lot for future development.

The property is located in the southwest corner of Stony Mountain near Memorial Boulevard, Dufferin Drive and King Edward Road. Proposed lots 1 to 18 would have driveways on Memorial Boulevard or Dufferin Drive, while lots 19 to 24 would have driveways onto a proposed public cul-de-sac.

Council approved the request.

- Council authorized the purchase of a half-page advertisement in the induction program for the 2024 Manitoba Softball Hall of Fame and Museum for \$150.
- Council authorized Heidelberg Materials Ltd. to haul from their north approach on Road 7E to Road 78N. In addition, Heidelberg Materials Ltd. must provide written approval from Glacial Stone Inc. to use Road 7E between roads 78N and 79N.
- The Rural Municipality of Rockwood is inviting quotes for hourly rental rates of various types of equipment to establish pay rates for the 2024 construction and maintenance season. 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Two candidates running for Town of Teulon byelection

Teulon's byelection set for March 6 has two candidates in the running for the council seat.

Former mayor of Teulon, Bert Campbell, and seed farmer Glenn Kletke are running for the position vacated by Ted Hodgkinson, who passed away late last year.

The Municipal Councils and School Boards Elections Act gives authority to the senior election officer (SEO) to appoint an assistant SEO. Colleen Howelko was appointed as assistant SEO for the 2024 Town of Teulon municipal byelection, and the remuneration will be set at a flat rate of \$250.

In accordance with the municipal policy, the council authorized the compensation of \$250 to be paid to each full-time voting official and \$18 an hour to each part-time voting offical, including mileage expenses (for any out-of-town workers), assisting the SEO with the 2024 Town of Teulon Municipal By-Election.

The regular council meeting scheduled for April 9 has been moved to April 1 at $\hat{6}$ p.m. as council wishes to attend the 2024 AMM Spring Convention on April 9.

Council approved the following payments:

- Staff payroll dated Jan. 19 for \$14,004.27 and staff payroll dated Feb. 2 for \$13,503.51.
- Staff payroll dated Feb. 16 for \$13,322.55 approved for payment.
- Council indemnities dated Feb. 10 for \$1,490.52.
- The fire department's payroll, dated Feb. 15 for \$5,317.70

IN OTHER COUNCIL NEWS:

- Town of Teulon council authorized office staff and public works foreman to attend the virtual Manitoba Emergency Management Organization (EMO) workshop on February 26 at the Teulon Civic Centre.

-The staff reports presented at the Jan. 31 committee of the whole meeting were accepted and may be released to the public upon request.

- The town hired an independent contractor to cut the grass at 181 Third Ave SE, 55 Fifth Ave SE and 238 Fourth St SW as they were unkept. An invoice for \$75 was sent to the owner of each of these properties to reimburse the town, but it is now past due, and the town has yet to receive a response. Council agreed that \$75 be added to taxes on each roll number: roll #16450,34900, and 31140, pertaining to each property.
- Teulon received a one-time per capita infrastructure funding from the province. The province requires the town to set up a separate interest-bearing account for the funds. Council has decided to direct administration to open a new savings account under account #25172 at Access Credit Union and name it "Rural

- Council is authorized to attend the CentrePort Canada executive partner-ship breakfast on Feb. 29.
- The CAO is authorized to attend the Canadian Association of Municipal Administrators Conference

Strategic Infrastructure Grant" and designate signing authorities for the account: Mayor Todd Campbell, Deputy Mayor Robin Nishibata, CAO Ka Shing (Chris) Yuen and assistant CAO Colleen Howelko.

- Council approved the CAO's overtime from Nov. 15 to Feb. 12 for 6.5
- Teulon will sponsor a horizontal quarter-page advertisement in the Interlake Travel Guide 2024 for \$400.
- Council gave the Teulon Curling Club "community event approval" for its 100th Centennial Committee Dinner and Dance on March in which liquor will be sold.
- Council awarded the 2024 Flower Tender to Whispering Oaks Greenhouse.
- Council approved the purchase of a video conferencing unit, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, to be installed in the board room of the Teulon Rockwood Centennial Centre.

Huminicki confident entering U21 provincial championships

Elias Huminicki walked off the pebbled ice in Stonewall earlier this month chin-up despite his team coming up short in the biggest game of their young careers.

The youthful Jordon McDonald rink out of Assiniboine Memorial, for which Huminicki plays second, had become one of the best stories of the week after giving tournament-favourite Team Carruthers all they could handle in the semi-final of the Viterra Manitoba men's provincial curling championship.

McDonald, Huminicki, along with third Dallas Burgess and lead Cam Olafson, fell 10-7 to the eventual champions, skipped by former Olympic gold medallist Brad Jacobs, but were tied going into the deciding 10th end in a game that few gave them a chance to win.

"Coming from a junior team, it was honestly so special and I believe that we have a new voice for junior curling, considering we were up against the top dog that weekend,"Huminicki reflected. "I didn't expect it to go as well as it did but we're very happy and very proud of ourselves for making it the way that we made it.

"All in all, it was just a win to even get the privilege to play Brad Jacobs in that semifinal game. It built our team so well after that weekend."

Indeed, the product of Winnipeg Beach is brimming with confidence heading into the U21 provincial cham-

pionship in Carman this weekend, where his squad will vie for a third-straight title. The championship, held at Carman Golf and Country Club, begins Wednesday and wraps up on Sunday.

Huminicki, 19, and McDonald are the two original members of the team that formed three years ago. While teammates have aged out of U21 eligibility, the team hasn't skipped a beat by adding Olafson and, this season, Burgess, who hails from Thunder Bay. Ont.

This season, Team McDonald has

primarily played in mens tournaments to condition themselves to higher competition. And the teens have held their own in many cases, such as a tied-for-third finish in the DEKALB Superspiel in Morris, in December.

"I'm looking forward to it," said Good, 18. "We've played in the (Manitoba Junior Curling Tour) against most of the teams that'll be there and we've had quite a bit of success. We're seeded third right now ... and out of all the bonspiels you play, this is the one you want to win."

Team Norris, which lost in the semi final of the U18 provincial championship last year, has enjoyed a strong season highlighted by a win in the MJCT's event in Petersfield.

"We just play to our game and we play our role on the team. You have to play to your strengths and I think we do that pretty good," he said.

Good has continued that success for Stonewall Collegiate, where he skipped the Rams to the provincial championship game but fell 7-4 to the Béliveau Barracudas. Despite falling short of the mark, Good said the experience of throwing high-pressure shots as the skip bodes well for him entering this week..

"I think so, just because you need to be so much more precise when you're throwing the last rock. If you pull up a foot short, it makes more of a difference and you have to be that little bit more on when you're throwing the last rock and skipping," Good said


"I understand now that I have to make my shots more accurate so I don't put so much pressure on my skip."
