"I'll definitely miss working here."


Lobb said she's looking forward to walking to the beach, learning more about her Icelandic heritage and visiting her family.



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
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Students speak out about playground improvements

From a young age, local elementary students are already learning the power of advocacy.

Rosser School is aiming to raise \$75,000 to improve its playground by installing a swing set, replacing a damaged slide and adding new feature equipment.

In mid-December, four Grade 3 and 4 students — Bruno, Whitney, Vaughn and Elliet — brought the cause forward at an RM of Rosser council meeting, along with parent advisory council member Derek Boonstra and principal Morag Ivany.

"The students spoke about the benefits of the playground project. Each student spoke confidently and from the heart on why the project is important for them and future generations of students and community members," Boonstra said.

"Presenting at council was an amazing opportunity for the Grade 3 and 4 students as they have been studying the different levels of government and the roles of the reeve and councillors in their social studies curriculum. A well-timed council break allowed for the students to enjoy some juice and cookies while mingling with the council and asking them countless questions about themselves and how the council operates."

In January, they learned their presentation was a success since the RM of Rosser confirmed a \$10,000 contribution to the playground project.

Rosser Reeve Frances Smee explained that council approved the funding after several meetings with the parent advisory council and other project stakeholders. She commended the group for their diligence, perseverance and flexibility in requesting funds from the municipality.

"The parent advisory committee

worked hard to ensure that council was well informed of the importance of this local initiative," Smee said, "which required a special request for the RM to provide funding in order to leverage the resources needed to initiate the project this year."

At the same time, Smee expressed appreciation for the students' heartfelt presentation.

"At the December meeting, Elliet, Vaughn, Whitney and Bruno came to present to council. They were all eloquent speakers and educated council on how important play structures are to the students of Rosser School. They each made a convincing presentation, explaining the social, health and emotional benefits that having access to a play structure provides," she said.

"They explained how the older students make sure the younger students get a turn and that no one is left out. It was our pleasure to support such a great project. And they and their classmates made and sent beautiful thank-you cards. We have good reason to be proud of the young people and staff at Rosser School."

School principal Morag Ivany also expressed pride in the students' impactful presentation.

"The students did a great job sharing their thoughts and ideas about why an additional swing set would be important on our playground, for both the school and the community," Ivany said.

"The swing set has been purchased and it will hopefully be installed in May or June."

Rosser Elementary School and its parent advisory council continue to focus on the importance of wellness, while also promoting mental health and physical development through play-based opportunities, Boonstra

"The playground is utilized by the students of Rosser Elementary School and the adjacent Rosser Community Club, which offers programing for children, youth and families to surrounding towns of Grosse Isle, Warren, Meadows, Rosser and Woodlands," Boonstra said.

"The additions to the playground will provide an enriched environment for the community."

To date, the parent advisory council has raised about \$22,000 towards its \$75,000 goal, including the contribution from the RM of Rosser and donations from local businesses including Prairie Roots Co-op, Leo's Sales and Service Co. Ltd, Ampere Electric Co. Ltd, Prairie Gear, and Ocean Trailers.

The group continues to apply for grants, seek community support and fundraise for the project.

Stonewall girl ready to return to Thailand for second stem cell therapy

A Stonewall girl hopes to return to Thailand for her second round of stem cell therapy, and the community is once again raising funds to help support her journey.

Two years ago, young Amaya Dawson's spinal cord was damaged in a car accident, leaving her paralyzed from the chest down. In November, she underwent stem cell treatment at the Verita Neuro facility in Bangkok, Thailand, through a process that isn't available in Canada.

She will be eligible to return to Thailand for the same treatment every six months as long as there's progress, and plans are in place to take her back in June for another round of stem

Amaya, who is nearly 10 years old, has noticed some changes since her first treatment. She's starting to have unintentional reflex spasms in her legs and she's also feeling sensations in her feet, thighs and stomach internally. At the same time, she's regaining some control of her personal functions, with the hopes of further improvements.

"She can't feel the touch but the inside of her foot will tingle. She knows something's there, but she doesn't know what it is," explained her mom, Alycia.

"They say it's a good sign that things are reconnecting or rejuvenating. Potentially, with more months or possibly more stem cells, she might actually get the sensation of feeling back — and this is the first step."

The cost of the hospital stay in Thailand is \$32,000 Canadian, which includes the stem cell treatment, seven nights of accommodation for Amaya and Alycia and possibly another helper. For the first trip, Alycia's friend, who is also a registered nurse, accompanied them to help, particularly since many places weren't accessible for Amaya's wheelchair. The cost also covers all of Amaya's meals throughout her stay, and she will get physiotherapy twice per day and electrotherapy once per day.

On top of that, they will also need to buy plane tickets.

For Alycia, it's more important that Amaya regain some personal independence than regain the ability to

"Amaya is still Amaya. Her attitude, her personality haven't changed one bit. She still has all her friends and her family. She is totally supported by the community, and the school is incredible with her," Alycia said.

"The fact of her not being able to walk was heartbreaking initially, but it's not such a huge thing anymore. It's just part of our life now, and now she has so much strength that she's able to sit up on her own. She has so much support and everybody still loves her, which is exactly what I want for her as her mom."

Fundraising for the upcoming Thailand trip is underway, and the com-

munity is once again stepping forward with support.

A bustling online garage sale is taking place through a Facebook group called "Amaya Takes Flight," which lists other fundraisers on an ongoing

With spring now here, Alycia also plans to host another plant sale, likely within the next month.

"They say the second round of stem

cells is when you see the most results, so we are grateful for every dollar because it all adds up," Alycia said.

"If it wasn't for all of the people that did the fundraisers last year and the people that participated, we wouldn't have gone to Thailand the first time. I'm trying to work my butt off to put in my own money, and the support of everyone else would be amazing."

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Roussin delivers final regular COVID-19 briefing

Manitoba's top doc held his final regularly scheduled COVID-19 briefing last week.

Coming one day after the last of the province's public health orders expired, chief provincial public health officer Dr. Brent Roussin emphasized at a virtual news conference March 16 that Manitoba is transitioning into the next phase of the pandemic — learning to live with the virus.

"We're certainly at a different place in this pandemic," he said. "We've been able to change our approach from strict public health measures to public health recommendations. That guidance is now available online to help support people in their own decision making to assess their level of risk when it comes to things like mask wearing, physical distancing and how many people they're comfortable with gathering."

The past two years have been filled with loss and divisiveness, Roussin observed, and it's time to move for-

"We know that COVID-19 will very likely be part of our lives for years to

come, so we can't wait for COVID-19 to be gone before we start our journey of healing.'

Roussin called on Manitobans for understanding and compassion.

"We may not have agreed on the best approach on public health measures. ... We may not all agree on the timing of the loosening of the restrictions, but I'm sure we can all agree that all Manitobans have been faced with tremendous challenges and difficulties during these last two years.

"We see businesses now, some choosing to keep the proof of vaccine; others leaving that in the past. Some people will continue to wear masks; others will give that up. For many, these choices aren't easy. But we sure can make it easier on each other if we show some respect, kindness, compassion for other people's decision as we navigate this transition period."

Even with restrictions gone, modelling suggests Manitoba will continue to see a downward trend overall in COVID-19 hospitalizations, Roussin

On Monday, the province's online COVID-19 dashboard had 388 people in hospital with the virus (down 26 from the Monday before) and 22 in ICU (up two). The death toll was at

Manitoba has already begun shutting down its pandemic infrastructure. Numerous testing sites were set to close this week and many vaccination supersites — including the one in Morden — are already closed, with more to follow in the weeks ahead. Roussin said embedded in these closure plans are plans to reopen testing and vaccination services again if needed in the future.

Vaccines will continue to be offered through clinics, pharmacies and at the supersite at the RBC Convention Centre in Winnipeg, which will remain open for now.

Health officials will continue to actively monitor COVID-19 indicators here in Manitoba, nationally and around the world, Roussin stressed.

"This is the last formal COVID-19 briefing, but I can assure Manitobans that our work on this virus is not stopping at this point."


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

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How I'm praying for Ukraine

I've been really struggling with what's happening in Ukraine. It's difficult watching videos of the constant assault and bombardment by the Russian army on those poor defenceless folk. Seeing hospitals being shelled and babies in ICUs being killed horrifies me. Watching as hundreds of thousands of people flee is heartbreaking.

As someone of Ukrainian descent, it is particularly difficult for me: both sets of my grandparents immigrated to Canada just over 100 years ago. I was thinking, had they not, I today would be in the midst of all that conflict. That, in turn, leads me to be very thankful and also to be full of prayer for my "home and native land," as it were.

So here is how I have been praying for the conflict in Ukraine. Obviously, I have been praying for the war to end. We are commanded in God's word to pray for peace and particularly for world leaders: "I urge, then, first of all, that requests, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for everyonefor kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness" (1 Timothy 2:1-2).

One of my prayers has been for Russian president, Vladimyr Putin, the man chiefly responsible for this unprovoked attack on Ukraine. I am praying that God would convict him of his immense sin and bring him to his knees in repentance. I have asked God to transform him from inside out and make him a born again person. Then, as such, my request has been to have Putin go on television and publicly announce his decision to accept Jesus as his personal Saviour. In that, I want him to admit that he has sinned greatly against both God and the Ukrainian people and to ask for forgiveness. He would then call off the war and proceed to a peaceful resolution.

I can't think of many things that would bring, in my opinion, more glory and honour to God than Vladimyr Putin's salvation and consequent public declaration of faith in Christ.

And so I ask.

Co-ops come together to support aid for Ukraine

A Red River Co-op employee who immigrated from Dnipro, Ukraine, to Winnipeg in 2015 has united Co-op locations across the province to collect over two tonnes of medical and tactical supplies for people in Ukraine.

"Several days after the war started, I was frantic. I was thinking, 'What can I do to help Ukraine? What do I do? Why am I here in Canada? Why am I not there?" said Anna Karpenko.

Many of Karpenko's family members were in Kyiv when Russia invaded the country in late February. They were able to evacuate Ukraine's capital city safely and fled to Dnipro in central Ukraine.

"Dnipro is relatively safe for now, and I hope it stays that way," said Karpenko.

In late February, Karpenko found a Canadian freight company based in Toronto that could send humanitarian packages to Poland, which could be picked up by truck and transported to Ukraine.

Grateful for an outlet to help Ukrainians, Karpenko began organizing items to send to Toronto and shared the news on Facebook.

"In a day, we had so many things donated and brought over that I had to do a call out for volunteers for packaging and wrapping."

Red River Co-op covered the \$6,000 cost of sending the first shipment from Manitoba to Toronto by truck.

The shipment of medical supplies, like tourniquets, gauze and bandages, and tactical gear, like elbow and knee pads, flashlights and walkie-talkies, reached Ukraine with the help of Come Back Alive, a Ukrainian organization that supports the Armed Forces of Ukraine.

The cost of sending the second ship-

ment to Toronto was covered by 12 Co-op locations across Manitoba, including Moosehorn, Ukrainian Farmers, Homestead, Prairie Roots, Dauphin, Interlake, Beausejour, Domain, Twin Valley, Clearview, Pembina, Sun Valley and Neepawa-Gladstone. The second shipment with around two tonnes of supplies reached Toronto and is being prepared to send to Poland.

"Co-ops were built to support community and our thoughts are with the people of Ukraine during this time," said Adrian Shabaga of Moosehorn Co-op.

"It really is overwhelming. I never thought that the response and the support would be so immense," said Karpenko.

The Ukrainian Farmers Co-op in Fisher Branch was one of the 12 Co-op locations to help Karpenko collect supplies and is now taking donations to support Ukrainian refugees coming to Canada.

"I think anytime the community finds somewhere they can donate, people are extraordinarily generous," said Kyle Yaciuk, owner of the Co-op.

The Co-op has also raised over \$3,500 by selling homemade borscht.

Sherisse Danish led the project, using her baba's recipe, and with the help of volunteers Ronnie Dandeneau, Aurele Meilleur, Jim Danish, Anne Podaim and Yaciuk, Danish made over 64 pots of soup.

Ukrainian Farmers Co-op is also accepting supplies including bedding, toiletries and diapers on behalf of the Ukrainian National Foundation in Winnipeg. All monetary donations will be sent to the Ukrainian Canadian Congress in Winnipeg and the Canadian Red Cross.

Stonewall council news in brief

Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman MP James Bezan provided some practical suggestions for how local residents can help in relation to the Ukraine crisis.

Bezan has been meeting with different municipal councils across the riding, and he was a delegation at the March 16 Stonewall council meeting.

"I'm asking for a number of things n relation to the crisis in Ukraine. I know that everybody wants to help," he told the *Tribune*. "A lot of people are making donations to the Red Cross, to Canada-Ukraine Foundation and other organizations that are trying put together humanitarian relief."

At the same time, Bezan said many people want to help with the refugees who will be arriving in Manitoba.

"We need to do a number of things. Let's identify excess housing stock where we can possibly put some of these families up. A lot of people have secondary residences or bed and breakfasts or Airbnbs, and those can be used to house refugees. Also, let's see if there are any job opportunities because they're going to be allowed to work," he said.

"And let's organize some language teaching as well because some of them are going to want to upgrade their English language skills and some of them are not going to have any English. We also need to identify

A dearly missed Teulon and Rockwood tradition is returning to the communities on April 9.

The Teulon Rockwood Firefighters Annual Ball is back after a two-year break because of public health restrictions, with 400 tickets available.

"We had people asking us before Christmas when we would start to sell tickets," said Ryan Trombo, fire chief of the Teulon Rockwood fire de-

"This event is our major fundraiser." The fire department will raise monev to buy additional equipment and training material through ticket sales for the event and a silent auction.

"In past years, when we were holding it, tickets were sold out between one and two weeks," said Trombo.

The department has already received monetary and prize donations like slow cookers and burn pits from local businesses and community

Earlier this year, the fire department also received a generous \$15,000 donation from Glen and Maureen Kletke that enabled the department to buy a Holmatro Combi Extrication tool.

"We have a fantastic budget to work with for the fire department," said Trombo.

"But like everything with emergency services ... you can't just throw \$30,000 worth of extrication tools into a budget."

The extrication tool is battery-operated, which makes it easier for the firefighters to grab and go, enabling quicker extrication from vehicles. The tool can also cut and spread metal on vehicles.

Now that the department has two extrication tools, they can simultaneously cut posts on a vehicle and remove vehicle roofs quicker.

"We really marvel at the dedication of the members of the Teulon Rockwood fire department," said Mau-

In other council news:

Communities in Bloom co-chairs Asta Johannesson and Shelley Proven shared their enthusiasm about Stonewall's entry in the national level of the competition this year.

- The Town of Stonewall will purchase a sponsorship package for the 2022 National Women's Invitational Baseball Championship, which will be held in Stonewall.

- The Town of Stonewall has repealed its vaccination policy for the general public, which requires all members of the public attending council meetings to be vaccinated against COVID-19. However, face masks or coverings are recommended to enter all town facilities.
- Council approved policy updates and amendments for Quarry Park recreation and cultural services. Rates increased slightly for summer 2022.
- Council adopted a revised accessibility plan in keeping with the Accessibility for Manitobans Act.
- The Mayor and CAO will sign a development agreement for Buildguru Custom Homes related to construction of a townhouse.

Warren preschoolers offered a new day program

Jennifer Paulson took action when she realized there were very few preschool program options in her community.

"When I was off with my son in 2018, there was nothing then either, so I thought, well, someone's got to start it," said Paulson.

Now a mother of two, Paulson is starting a preschool program at the Warren Memorial Hall to allow parents and young children to get out of the house for an hour every week to socialize and play games.

"With COVID, people haven't been able to get together," said Paulson.

"I thought (this would) be an opportunity for the little ones and their parents to finally meet people in the community."

On Tuesdays, Paulson plans to guide children aged three to five through exercises, songs and activities while

parents of younger children can socialize and play games with toys and supplies provided by Paulson and the Rosser Woodlands Recreation Commission.

"There's been quite the interest in the group," she said.

Around 15 families have signed up for the program through the Warren Tots Facebook page Paulson created to gauge the community's opinion.

This program could also make the transition into kindergarten easier for children who haven't had

the opportunity to meet and interact with other children during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"I've noticed with my own son it's been hard for him being around other kids and knowing how to play with other kids because we haven't had the chance to do that."

Paulson has been on maternity leave since her daughter Olivia was born in July 2021 and will return to teaching elementary students in September.

"I'm a teacher, so this gives me a chance to do what I love while I'm off on maternity leave."

Paulson said she wants the program to continue after she goes back to work at a school in Transcona and won't be able to lead the group.

"I'm hoping to get it started, and then hopefully it'll blossom from there, and someone else will take it over, and it can continue to grow."

The program is planned to start on April 5. Families will be charged a \$3 drop-in fee to cover the cost of renting the hall and supplying snacks and activities. Families from Warren, Woodlands, Rosser, Marquette and Grosse Isle are welcome to join.

Flooding conditions improve a bit in March outlook

Things are looking a little better when it comes to potential flooding along the Red River this spring.

In its second 2022 spring flood outlook last week, Manitoba's Hydrologic Forecast Centre put the worst-case scenario for spring flooding at the levels seen along the Red in 2011.

That high risk of flooding is with unfavourable weather conditions — lots of rain or snow over the next few weeks.

With favourable conditions, the risk of flooding is still considered major, though more like the peak levels seen in 2019 from Emerson to the Red River Floodway Inlet.

"Normal" weather over the coming weeks would put the expected flooding levels close to that seen in 2020.

Red River tributaries, including the Roseau, Rat and Pem-

bina rivers, are also at a high risk of moderate to major flooding, depending on what the next few weeks of weather brings us.

Due to below-normal soil moisture at freeze-up and normal to well above normal winter precipitation, there is high risk of moderate flooding in the Assiniboine River and its tributaries, including Souris River basin, and in the eastern region, including the Whiteshell Lakes area, the report notes.

The risk of spring flooding is low for Interlake and northern Manitoba regions. The risk of flooding for most Manitoba lakes is also low.

The province notes the predicted peak levels of flooding across Manitoba right now are expected to remain below the dikes and community flood protection levels, which have been raised significantly since the Flood of the Century in 1997.

"The magnitude of the spring runoff on Manitoba's rivers is still very dependent on weather conditions from now till the spring melt and during the spring melt period," the report stresses. "A late thaw and spring rainstorms could result in a rapid snow melt that increases overland flooding and the flows on tributary streams and the larger rivers.

"A single precipitation event similar to the rainstorm that occurred in the summer of 2014 could change the flood outlook significantly."

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Young and old returning to social life through arts programming

The Green Acres Art Centre has several new programs on deck for the upcoming year, including expanding opportunities for seniors to socialize and families to play together.

In 2014, 29 per cent of Teulon's population was 65 years old or older, and the median age for the town was 50

Knorr said the grant from The New Horizons helps welcome the community back together.

"They want wellness and to bring people together, especially with the pandemic," said Knorr.

Cards, board games and crafts for seniors will also be available.

"The ultimate goal is to have it be an opportunity to socialize and have other activities."

In addition to planning summer camps, GAAC is reviewing several programs for parents and preschool-age children that explore learning together through dance, theatre, crafts and play throughout the

"It's an opportunity for parents to get out of the house with their child," said Knorr.

"These little ones have been at home. They really need some social interaction to get ready for school. It's a huge adjustment."

Heather McDermid will lead the free Growing Green program for parents and children between one and six years old in Teulon at Green Acres Park and Stonewall at Stonewall Quarry Park.

The outdoor program uses nature as a learning tool, said McDermid.

"We encourage families to go outside and explore. Families can gain an appreciation for the world around them, and it fosters environmental awareness and compassion."

The program is also an opportunity for parents to meet other families in the community.

Elisa Hunt recently joined the GAAC team and will lead art programs in the spring.

The popular program Come Dance with Me, led by dance instructors Alycia Campbell and Elena Modrzejewski, is returning to GAAC. The free parent and child program is for children up to age three and runs for up to six weeks.

"This gives (the children) a little bit of an introduction to dance," said

"Some of the ones that did the Come Dance with Me in the summer joined our Little Stars Program in the fall."

The Inspire, Imagine and Create program for children between two and four years old is continuing this year led by Arthur Holroyd.

Maegan Trach is leading the Little Learners program for children between three and five years old to practise literacy and numeracy through music and hands-on activities before entering kindergarten.

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Animals to benefit from Ethan Boyer legacy fund

The memory of a much-loved local teen lives on — and so does his great love of animals.

Ethan Boyer lost his life in a traffic crash at Brady Road at the young age of 19 in October 2019. Now his mom Sue, dad Dana and brother Reid have set up a legacy fund in Ethan's honour to benefit a cause that was close to his heart.

The Ethan Boyer Memorial Fund – Tin for the Critter Bin, set up through the Interlake Community Foundation, is designed to provide an annual grant to one or more pet charities chosen by his family.

The idea came to Sue as a result of a similar fund set up in honour of McKenna Riley, a young local woman who died in 2020 at the age of 20. She got a pamphlet in the mail explaining how the Interlake Community Foundation pools gifts in a capital fund that remains in perpetuity. The income generated is then distributed as grants to registered charities.

"Dana and I had a conversation that maybe we should do something like that for Ethan because it would be nice to keep his memory going hopefully long after we pass. It would also be a way for people who want to donate financially to contribute to Ethan's memorial fund. From there, we disburse to different animal charities," she said.

"Ethan loved animals. In his Grade 12 year at Stonewall Collegiate Institute, they went to Greece and there were a lot of animals running the streets. He'd send us pictures, saying 'Mom, Dad, look at this cat! Look at this dog! I want to bring them home."

Ethan also loved animals closer to

the family's home near Balmoral, including his own dog Thanos.

"He said Thanos was the best dog we ever had. He was always and forever picking up strays. We would bring them home and feed them at the side of the ditch because we live in the country," Sue said.

"He loved animals more than he loved people because animals love you unconditionally and they're always there when you're lonely or sad. He loved them a lot, and we had quite a few animals in our house."

Their pooch Thanos, whose name

reflects Ethan's love for the Marvel universe, also helped the family cope during difficult moments.

"After Ethan's crash, there were days that were dark. As Sue says, there were days when we wanted to just curl up in the corner and cry—but we had to walk the dogs. They sensed something was up and they knew Ethan wasn't around, but they had to be walked several times a day," Dana said.

"They sure got walked a lot because those walks are very therapeutic. You can say things to the dogs and to the

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KAP calls for immediate back-to-work legislation

Keystone Agricultural Producers (KAP) calls upon the federal government to introduce back-to-work legislation so that the current CP rail work stoppage ends immediately.

Additionally, immediate and co-operative action by all parties needs to be taken.

"The work stoppage will exacerbate an already difficult situation. A work stoppage for any length of time means lost shipping opportunities that will never be recovered. The current global supply chain crisis has people around

the world very concerned about their food and energy supply," said Bill Campbell, president, Keystone Agricultural Producers.

Rail service for the agricultural value chain is critical to meeting demand for our domestic and export customers. The livelihoods of Canadian farmers, and the entire value chain, depend on Canada's ability to deliver agricultural product efficiently and on time. Past service disruptions have caused significant damage to Canada's reputation as a reliable supplier.

"Delays in fulfilling contracts have

also impacted the reputation of the Canadian brand with our customers," added Campbell. "Reliability is a key component of the Canadian brand. Shortfalls this year, and in the past such as 2013-14, will resonate with customers for years to come."

There is currently a backlog of grain on farms that was expected to have been delivered to export customers. Additionally, there are shortages of dried distillers' grain, soybean meal, fertilizer and feed that are needed urgently and require rail transport.

Additionally, fertilizer, which is desperately required by producers in the spring, must be brought up from the United States into Canada and needs to be distributed throughout supply networks over the next month. Canadian Pacific Railway plays a major part of this operation.

"The agricultural value chain has been advocating for some time that rail service be deemed an essential service that would prevent future work stoppages and secure Canada's supply chain," concluded Campbell.

people 12 years of age and older," said the agency in a March 17 statement. "The clinical trial showed that the immune response in children 6 to 11 years of age was comparable to the immune response in people 18 to 25 years of age, supporting the vaccine efficacy in this younger age group."

It added that no "serious" adverse events were observed during the trial.

Moderna said its mRNA vaccine was found to be "generally well tolerated" in a KidCOVE study it carried out to evaluate safety, tolerability and effectiveness. Over 400 children in Canada took part in the study, which had over 4,000 child participants.

"Health Canada was the first regulator to fully approve our COVID-19 vaccine, and we are pleased they have taken this important step to expand this authorization to children aged 6 to 11 years," said Moderna chief executive officer Stephane Bancel in a March 17 statement.

On the same day, Moderna announced it had asked the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for approv-

al to offer a fourth dose — an additional booster dose — of its vaccine to adults aged 18 and older.

Research has shown that the vaccine's protection wanes within months of receiving a third dose. A similar loss of protection against COVID was also found with Pfizer's mRNA vaccine.

Moderna's vaccine carries an increased risk of myocarditis and pericarditis, particularly in males 18 to 24 years of age, the company advises.

Health Canada authorized Moderna's vaccine for adults in December 2020 and for children aged 12 to 17 in August 2021.

Moderna is working on an omicron-specific vaccine booster and is in the process of carrying out research with participants.

"Our goal has been to remain ahead of the virus and we are committed to generating and sharing data with public health authorities as they prepare for the fall booster season," said Bancel in a March 10 statement.

bush and to each other that you normally don't say when you're sitting together at a table."

The family also plans to continue organizing a "Tin for the Critter Bin" donation drive each October as a way to collect pet food and other items needed by animal rescues. Last year, they collected about 10 truckloads of donated pet items.

Interlake Community Foundation board chair Bob Beck shared his sentiments about the new fund in Ethan's honour.

"The loss of a community member is always hard and especially when we lose our youth," Beck said.

"My son played hockey with both Ethan and his brother Reid. The shock of this tragedy was felt within the entire community and we are honoured to be able the help the family with the establishment of this fund."

Remarkable bench up for raffle to support refugees

Multicoloured flowers like a vinok, a traditional Ukrainian flower crown, line the bench Robert Unik carved honouring Ukrainians.

Vibrant orange and yellow pysanky, Ukrainian Easter eggs, join the bench's legs and arms, and clean white cloth with red embroidery on its edges covers the seat inscribed with a clear message written in Ukrainian, "Peace for Ukraine."

The county's blue and yellow flag appears to be shifting in the wind on a flagpole on the backrest of the bench and protected by sunflowers, Ukraine's national flower and a symbol of resistance since Russia invaded Ukraine in February.

"When I was carving, I got a lot of tears," said Unik, whose family is from Ukraine.

"Looking at it and seeing the babas and the mothers and the children while their husbands are going to fight the war."

Unik has been carving for almost four decades and is known for molding benches, cottage signs and pelicans out of wood.

Carving the intricate bench for three weeks was an outlet for Unik to express Ukrainian culture and pride while also creating the focus of a fundraiser.

Unik has partnered with the Selkirk Rotary Club to offer the bench as a raffle prize, with all proceeds going towards Ukrainian refugees settling in Manitoba.

Supporters will be able to buy raffle tickets for \$20 in a few weeks and the final draw will be held on Canada Day.

Unik chose to dedicate the money raised from the bench's raffle to newcomers because of the outpouring of support for people living in Ukraine. He also wants to take his time raising as much money as he can.

"I don't want to donate (the bench) or just sell it because I can make a lot more money with a raffle," said Unik.

"I'm in no rush."

The raffle also gives people living in the Interlake the chance to donate and participate in welcoming Ukrainians into the province.

"I wanted something for us in this area," said Unik, who lives in Selkirk.

Mercs lead Hawks 3-0 in SEMHL final series

The Warren Mercs are one win away from winning the South Eastern Manitoba Hockey League title.

Warren now leads the best-of-seven final series 3-0 after a 4-2 home win on Sunday evening.

"It definitely takes the pressure off," said Mercs' defenceman Chad Deprez. "Notre Dame is a team that applies pressure for all 60 minutes. It's nice to have a bit of a gap on them now."

Notre Dame's Connor Hamonic opened the game's scoring at 3:46 of the first period. But Mercs' forward Chase Faulkner replied with a huge power-play goal with just seven seconds remaining in the opening frame.


Couch led the Jets to a Manitoba



Today would have been your 85th birthday. I came here to "The Pasture" where your blood and tears live on in the earth and stars, to pay homage and reflect. I knew, as a child, that you would never live to be 85. You were never careless, but the work was what mattered and you gave your all, body and soul. There were numerous injuries over the years, close calls together with the ever present sore muscles, aches and pains who never left your side.

I am not alone here, the shadow of the lonely windmill watches every nuance, hears every breath. It looms tall and aching, its bones brittle and broken, its limbs creaking, tired and straining, against the bleeding sky.

It's true that cowboys never really leave a place where they've given their all, and all of themselves was taken. Even now, after all these years, I feel your heartbeat, like Buttermilk's hoof beats pummelling over the land. And in the wind, that somehow deifies the trees and finds its way to me. I feel your strength and courage - strength and courage necessary to do this iob and do it well.

I can see you riding tall and proud, Buttermilk's head high and alert, waiting for your cue. The two of you, always one. The blue and wild sky, like your eyes, melts gently into the horizon.

I know that not only were you a cowboy, but a man with innate knowledge and understanding of a life and style of life, an attitude married to a spirit of land, sky and heaven. But this life is no easy ride. Long hours in and out of the saddle, sacrificing your body, a year too dry, and worse a year too wet. Each haunted by their own hardships.

The leaves are changing their colours now, reminding everyone that soon the chill in the air will hang so bitterly cold it will burn inside your nostrils, as you breath heavily from the strain of the work. The blistering chill holds joy though, that soon the work will be done for the fall. Round-up, with its endless hours and many perils, brings an end to the cycle of work for a cowboy, here at "The Pasture". Where the work was hardest, and almost killed you, there is triumph.

The triumph from knowing that you did your best. From the birth of that first calf in spring to bringing the last cow to the corral in the fall, the wind at your face, boundless sky above. warmth of the horse under you, freedom to be a real part of this breathing earth - you are a real hero, my dear, sweet, perfect Dad.

I knew from birth, that I was, what I always wanted to be - Pete Skihar's daughter. We were united spirits, bonded by love so strong, that not even death could break it.





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
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
