Hope in motion: Lefley family walks for ALS

Walk to End ALS set for June 7 at Assiniboine Park

A local woman is sharing her story in an effort to raise awareness about ALS

ALS, or amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, is a disease that progressively paralyzes people because the brain is no longer able to communicate with the muscles of the body.

Over time, the brain's connection with the muscles of the body break down to the point that someone living with ALS will lose the ability to walk, talk, eat, swallow and eventually breathe.

In Canada, nearly 4,000 people live with ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease. Sandy Lefley of Grosse Isle is one of them.

"When I think back, it started in 2011 with just a minor breathing issue. I have exercised for many years and knew something was off. So over the years, I went through some tests and it was said I had acid reflux or anxiety. So I went with that," 66-year-old Lefley shared via email.

"Then in June of 2022, all of a sudden I started slurring my words. It was very minor and periodic at the time. Then I started having trouble swallowing and would sometimes choke when I ate or drank. I got in to see a neurologist and he came to the conclusion that it was stress or anxiety also or an adult stutter."

In May 2024, Lefley went to the Mayo Clinic in Minneapolis seeking more information.

"We spent a week there going through numerous tests. The hard part is ALS isn't diagnosed in CT scans or MRIs. It is a process of elimination. I was tested for many other things and everything came back negative," said Lefley, who led a healthy lifestyle with exercise and diet.

"And the breathing part I described was not my lungs or heart. It is the muscles around it that are not functioning properly. So in the end, that left ALS. Mine is predominately the bulbar ALS. My type of ALS is not genetic. I do have some minor symptoms in my body but nothing major yet."

Since 2022, Lefley's ability to speak has gradually declined.

"Now it is to the point where no one understands what I am saying, so I have an app which I can type in what I want to say and it says it out loud. Or I just type something in my phone and show them. As you can imagine, it is hard to get a word in edgewise," she said.

"If I am with a group of people, the conversation moves so fast — by the time I type something, it is too late. Being with one or two people, it is more manageable. And the swallowing part, I am now restricted to eating and drinking certain foods or using my feeding tube. It is very difficult to go out for supper or eat at someone else's house because of my restrictions."

Although Lefley is dealing with many changes and challenges, she

remains grateful for all the resources available in Manitoba.

"We do have wonderful resources for people living with ALS. There is an ALS clinic at Deer Lodge that specifically monitors ALS patients. They really take good care of you and help you with what you need to do to live with this disease. You have a whole team at your side," she said.

"There is also the ALS Society, which

you can go to for things you might need free of charge. I also have a feeding tube and there is the Manitoba Home Nutrition Program that takes good care of your journey. You get all the supplies and formula you need from them for your feeding and delivered to your door at no extra cost." At the same time, Lefley embrac-

es some wise words shared with her

Tax changes, fire hall debt and park plans in Teulon's 2025 budget

Town of Teulon 2025 financial plan

Property owners in Teulon could face increases or decreases to their municipal taxes this year, depending on their reassessment.

Properties with an increase of less than 17.7 per cent should see a municipal tax increase of less than 6.65 percent, while properties with an assessment increase greater than 17.7 per cent will likely face a municipal property tax increase of greater than 6.65 per cent. The reassessment reflects how property values have changed since the last assessment in 2023.

In 2025, the bulk of operating expenses will go towards fiscal services (29%), general government services (19%), recreation and cultural services (17%) and protective services (15%). Other expenses will go to transportation services (10%), environmental health services (5%), reserves transfers (3%), environmental development services (1%), economic development services (1%) and public health and welfare services (0.1%).


In 2025, the Town of Teulon will pay a debenture of \$44,265.83 towards the Teulon-Rockwood fire hall. The closing balance is \$500,371.14 with a maturity date of 2039.

Other 2025 budget highlights include a pumper and tanker for the fire department (\$225,000), hall washroom upgrades (\$95,000), half-ton truck (\$40,000), cage and pallet forks (\$5,000), flail mower (\$18,000), arena upgrades (\$20,000), park and campground improvements (\$13,979) and baseball diamond and rodeo ground improvements (\$9,610).

Looking ahead, the town will continue to support the safer school pathway project, as well as signature community events and the food bank. In addition, in partnership with an anonymous donor, the town will expand the trails in Green Acres Park.

The Town of Teulon also signed a new three-year agreement with the curling club this year.

And starting in the fall, the Teulon Minor Hockey Association will install a hockey shooting corner in the Teulon Rockwood arena on the outside wall of the rink in memory of Wes Kilberry.



Some Teulon property owners will face an increase in municipal taxes while others will face a decrease.

In 2024, indemnities and other expenses totalled \$8,122.16 for Mayor Todd Campbell and \$8,615.47 for Deputy Mayor Robin Nishibata. Similarly, indemnities and expenses totalled \$7,076.07 for Coun. Michael Hepples, \$6,803.97 for Coun. Kirt Ansell and \$5,093.55 for Coun. Glenn Kletke.

Planning to Build a Deck this Summer?

Keep the South Interlake Planning District (SIPD) in mind if you are planning to build a deck this summer. A Development and Building Permit is required for a deck that:

- > Is two feet or higher from the ground; or
- → Is attached to a building; or
- → Has walls or a roof; or
- > Is intended to support a structure such as a hot tub or pergola.

You do NOT need a permit for an unenclosed or detached deck less than two feet in height, or for landings of 50 ft² or less in floor area. However, please note that zoning setbacks shall be satisfied whether a permit is required or not.

Permits help ensure that buildings and structures meet the Manitoba Building Code, which makes things safer for everyone!

5 springtime safety tips for pets

Below, we've outlined five key tips to help you identify potential pet concerns as you spring into the new

1. Use pet-friendly cleaning supplies

To thwart troubles before they start, opt for pet-safe cleaning supplies wherever possible, and store unsafe chemicals out of paws' reach. As a rule of thumb, keep your pet away from where you're cleaning, and wait for all surfaces to dry thoroughly before letting them back into the space.

2. Play it safe with plants

One of the first steps of ensuring spring safety for pets is knowing which plants are pet friendly. Most pet owners know certain plants are poisonous to pets but even your petsafe blossoms can be troublesome if ingested by dogs and cats. Large leaves and stems (especially those with thorns!) can lead to choking and damage along the intestinal tract.

3. Secure your window screens

As you open windows, make sure your furry friends aren't at risk of sneaking out or falling. Install sturdy screens with a snug fit and supervise your pets around any open windows.

4. Avoid newly fertilized grass (for at least 24 hours)

Keep your furry friend off the grass and away from any treated areas for at least 24 hours or opt for pet-safe products. Be cautious of organic fertilizer too — its captivating scent might tempt your dog to make a meal out of manure..

5. Schedule a veterinary dental cleaning

Spring safety for pets also involves dental health, and spring is a good time to get your dog or cat's teeth cleaned. Periodontal disease is the most common disorder that affects cats and dogs. Dental disease can cause much more than just bad breath for your pet; it can cause tooth, bone, and gum loss and lead to heart dis-



RCMP confirm homicide after human remains found in RM of Rockwood

Manitoba RCMP have confirmed the death of a 75-year-old man as a homicide, months after his remains were discovered at a property in the RM of Rockwood.

Dimitar Rachev was identified as the victim after human remains were found near a residence off Highway 7 on Nov. 21, 2024. Investigators now say he was killed.

On May 15, 2025, RCMP Major Crime Services, assisted by a forensic anthropology team, conducted a secondary ground search at the Rockwood property as part of the ongoing investigation.

Police are asking to speak with anyone who had contact with Rachev after Nov. 1, 2024. They are also seeking the public's help in identifying a man shown in surveillance images who may have information about the case.

The investigation began last fall when Stonewall RCMP responded to a report of found human remains and secured the scene. A search of the property was carried out in the days that followed by multiple RCMP units, including Forensic Identification Services and Search and Rescue.

As part of the investigation, officers sought a grey 2007 Saturn Ion with Manitoba licence plate HGL 773 believed to have been removed from the property. The vehicle was later located in Winnipeg on Nov. 26 following a tip from the public.

"I am on a medication to slow the disease down but, of course, I would like to see more money go towards research so that maybe the next generation can have a cure."

Her daughter Sarah also participated in the ALS Ice Bucket Challenge, which involves pouring a bucket of ice water over a person's head to raise awareness and support.

"It has gone through countless friends and relatives over the last couple of weeks and is still going strong. I am so humbled by the participation — it is very overwhelming. I am so lucky to have so many friends and relatives I know I can count on with this path that was chosen for me," she said.

"And, of course, my husband Chuck, my daughter Sarah, her husband Chris and my two grandchildren Kit and Wren have all been a huge support for me."

"Sandy's Team" is currently collecting online pledges for the Walk to End ALS at https://alscanadawalktoendals.als.ca/manitoba2025/sandys-team. Cheques are also accepted.

And all are welcome to join Lefley and her team for the Walk to End ALS, which takes place on Saturday, June 7 at Assiniboine Park, 55 Pavilion Cres. Registration is at 8:30 a.m. and the five-kilometre walk starts at 10 a.m. There is plenty of parking on site, washrooms are available and snacks will be provided for participants.

Looking ahead, the ALS Society will hold another fundraiser on Thursday, June 19 at a Goldeyes game in Blue Cross Park.

Governments boost wages for Manitoba early childhood educators

Federal and provincial funding to support recruitment, expand child-care access

Early childhood educators across Manitoba are getting a significant wage increase, the largest in provincial history, through funding from the Canada-Manitoba Early Learning and Child Care Agreement.

Federal Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Official Languages Patty Hajdu and Manitoba Education Minister Tracy Schmidt announced the increase Friday, saying it aims to strengthen the child-care workforce and help expand access for

"In order to provide families in Canada with high-quality, affordable child care, we need to support the early childhood education workforce with better compensation," said Hajdu. "Development that happens in early childhood plays a big role in future learning, so it's important to keep highly trained, qualified people in this field and also attract future educators."

The new provincial wage grid, retroactive to April 1, boosts hourly pay by up to \$5 depending on certification level and centre size. This year's update targets frontline educators.

"Early childhood educators are the foundation of a humming and productive economy," said Schmidt. "Because of their work, parents across Manitoba can go to school or build careers that power our province. With this historic wage increase we are valuing the role ECEs play in our province.

The federal and provincial governments will provide \$60.4 million to licensed and funded child-care facilities to support wage increases — \$56.2 million from Ottawa and \$4.2 million from Manitoba. A two per cent boost to base operating grants, totalling \$4.55 million, is also included.

"This is both a historic and monumental day for ECEs across the province," said Jodie Kehl, executive director of the Manitoba Child Care Association. "ECEs are the essential foundation on which we will develop a high quality ELCC system for Manitoba children and families."

The five-year Canada-Manitoba agreement, signed in 2021, directs \$1.2 billion in federal funds toward building a \$10-a-day child-care system and expanding access for children under seven. A February extension added \$1.9 billion in funding through 2031.



Manitoba and Ontario agree to knock down interprovincial trade barriers

The Manitoba government has signed an agreement with the Ontario government to boost the flow of goods, services, investment and workers between the provinces, Premier Wab Kinew and Ontario Premier Doug Ford announced last week.

"We're facing a tariff war on two fronts and now is the time to build up this country we love so much," said Kinew. "Through this agreement with Ontario, we will unlock more economic opportunities for people in both provinces. As premiers, we are all working toward the common goal of powering our Canadian economy toward the future."

The premiers signed a memorandum of understanding at Queen's Park to signal their intention to reduce interprovincial trade barriers, including direct-to-consumer alcohol sales and improved labour mobility between Manitoba and Ontario.

"Working together with provinces and territories across Canada, we are building a stronger, more competitive and more resilient economy that will protect our workers and communities and tie our country together," said

"Today's MOU is just the latest step we are taking to unlock the enormous potential of true free trade within Canada, which will lower costs for families and add up to \$200 billion to our national gross domestic product. I'm grateful to Premier Kinew for his partnership and leadership in getting this MOU done, and I look forward to signing additional MOUs with other provinces as we move forward."

The premiers said the agreement would see the provinces rely on both existing legislation and upcoming legislation in Manitoba to help grow Canada's economy. They also encouraged other provinces to remove internal trade barriers, including through reciprocal mutual recognition.

In 2021, the value of interprovincial trade between Ontario and Manitoba totalled \$19.5 billion.

Manitoba boosts veterinary training with \$8.3M investment

Renewed agreement with Western College of Veterinary Medicine ensures seats for Manitoba students

The Manitoba government is renewing its partnership with the University of Saskatchewan's Western College of Veterinary Medicine (WCVM) and increasing its financial commitment to ensure more Manitobans can access veterinary training.

Advanced Education and Training Minister Renée Cable and Agriculture Minister Ron Kostyshyn announced the updated agreement last week, which includes a \$8.3-million investment for 2025-26.

"By renewing this agreement, our government is stepping up with additional investments to train more Manitobans at the Western College of Veterinary Medicine," said Cable. "We're working with other provinces to support animal health so that our agriculture sector can continue to grow and thrive."

The multi-party agreement includes the governments of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, along with the University of Saskatch-

"Farmers navigating animal health issues such as avian influenza rely on the expertise of veterinarians as a necessary part of ensuring the health of livestock," said Kostyshyn. "High standards of health in veterinary medicine are key not just for the safety of animals but for our economy as well."

The WCVM, based in Saskatoon, is the only veterinary college in Canada that guarantees dedicated seats for Manitoba students. As the premier centre for veterinary education and research in Western Canada, it plays a critical role in training future veterinarians with expertise in both animal rural communities.

and public health.

"There is strong demand for veterinarians across the province," said Cable. "This partnership agreement to support training Manitobans is helping meet this need."

Saskatchewan's Minister of Advanced Education Ken Cheveldayoff also praised the college and its interprovincial role.

"We are proud of the Western College of Veterinary Medicine and the exceptional education opportunities it provides to veterinary students from across Western Canada," he said.

More than 500 students are enrolled in French immersion this school year at Ecole RW Bobby Bend School, Ecole Stonewall Collegiate School and Collège Stonewall Collegiate.

These totals include 436 students from within the catchment plus 92 students from out of the catchment.

IN OTHER SCHOOL DIVISION **NEWS**:

Federal Liberal government to provide income tax cut to help with cost of living

The federal Liberal government announced last week that it will bring in legislation to provide a tax cut for nearly 22 million Canadians.

Finance and national revenue minister Francois-Philippe Champagne announced the tax relief measure last Wednesday, saying Canadians expected to see a plan for change to address the high cost of living when they voted for a Liberal government, and that the government is now delivering that change.

The tax cut aims to provide relief to middle-class workers. Those with incomes in the two lowest tax brackets — those with taxable income under \$114,750 in 2025 and those with taxable income of \$57,375 and below in 2025 — will receive the bulk of the tax relief measure.

"With today's middle-class tax cut, we are setting the stage for economic growth by helping hard-working Canadians keep more of their paycheques to spend on the priorities that matter most to them. Every Canadian should be able to afford necessities, feel secure and get ahead financially and this tax cut will help them do just that," said Champagne in a May 14 news release. "As Canadians continue to feel the impact of ongoing challenges including trade and tariff uncertainties, they should be able to keep more of what they earn to help build a stronger future and a more resilient Canada."

Once legislated, the lowest marginal personal income tax rate will be reduced from 15 per cent to 14 per cent effective July 1, states the news release.

The tax cut is expected to deliver over \$27 billion in tax savings to Canadians over five years, starting in 2025-26. Two-income families are expected to save up to \$840 a year in

To reflect a one-percentage-point cut in the lowest tax rate coming into effect halfway through the year, the full-year tax rate for 2025 will be 14.5

per cent and the full-year rate for 2026 and future tax years will be 14 per cent, states the release.

The Canada Revenue Agency will update its source deduction tables for the July to December 2025 period so that pay administrators are able to reduce tax withholdings as of July 1. This means that, effective July 1, individuals with employment income and other income subject to source deductions could have tax withheld at 14 per cent. Otherwise, individuals will realize this tax relief when they file their 2025 tax returns in spring

Province commits \$120M for Prairie Innovation Centre at Assiniboine College

Prairie Innovation Centre Will Create Jobs, Meet Growing Labour Demands

The Manitoba government is investing \$120 million in a major post-secondary project aimed at boosting agriculture training and job creation in the province's Westman region.

Premier Wab Kinew announced

Thursday the province will provide \$60 million in capital funding and an additional \$60 million in bridge financing to support construction of the Prairie Innovation Centre for Sustainable Agriculture at Assiniboine Community College's North Hill Campus in Brandon.

agriculture "Manitoba's is critical to our province's economy and to staying resilient against Trump's tariffs," said Kinew. "The Prairie Innovation Centre will house new and expanded training, so Manitobans can learn the skills they need to get good, in-demand ag jobs here in Westman and across the province."

Of the capital funding, \$40 million will go toward construction of the innovation centre and \$20 million will support the development of a new 216-seat child-care facility within the project.

The province has also approved bridge financing to allow work to begin immediately.

Assiniboine College president Mark Frison said the commitment allows the project to move forward without delay.

"We are pleased the province is providing the financing for the Prairie Innovation Centre," said Frison. "It is an important project that will help to improve value-added processing and export development capacity in the agriculture sector."

Frison said the college will continue working with the province to secure federal support for the project.

The new centre is expected to add hundreds of training seats in agriculture and related industries, expanding the region's capacity to meet growing labour demands. It will also serve as a hub for research and collaboration with industry partners.

In addition to long-term workforce development, Kinew said the centre's construction is expected to create nearly 1,000 jobs.



Submission deadline is June 12 in three different categories for the annual competition

Is there a beautiful yard in the community that deserves to be recognized?

The Manitoba Good Roads Association is back with their annual competition. As a member of the association, the RM of Woodlands is on the lookout for nominees for the next Manitoba Good Roads Association awards in three categories: best farm home grounds, best non-farm rural home grounds and best home grounds in an urban centre.

Submissions can be sent to pwclerk@rmwoodlands.ca — and be sure to include the category, property owner and physical address. The RM of Woodlands will contact the homeowners for consent before entering them in the contest.

The submission deadline is June 12. After that, council will choose one submission per category to represent the RM of Woodlands in the contest. Judging is set to take place this summer.

Regional water project update

Woodlands council will submit a request to the Public Utilities Board to use a debenture surcharge to repay borrowing for a regional water project. This project involves constructing a reverse osmosis water treatment plant, new water supply reservoirs in Stonewall and Warren, new supply wells and a water supply pipeline from Stonewall to Warren.

The RM proposes to repay the debenture by a surcharge on the Warren utility bills, which requires approval from the Public Utilities Board.

Council gave first reading to a general borrowing bylaw at a special meeting on April 10 to pay for the project.

IN OTHER COUNCIL NEWS:

- Council gave first and second readings to a bylaw to regulate and control firearms within townsites and designated areas.
- Council gave second and third readings to establish and incorporate Park 150. The RM is working with Scatliff + Miller + Murray to design a public park to commemorate the municipality's 150th anniversary of incorporation. Council approved the preliminary park design and engaged with the public to finalize the park design. As part of the project, up to 20 trees will be planted each year recognizing individuals, groups and organizations. Over five years, 100 trees will be planted. Nominations will be accepted until June 15 on the RM of Woodlands website at rmwoodlands.ca.
- The South Interlake ATV Club has closed the Interlake Pioneer Trail to off-road ve-

hicles until further notice due to dry conditions and risk of fire.

- Council accepted a \$4,035.05 quote from Site Docs for an annual subscription and standard implementation.

"Our entire Conservative Shadow Cabinet is




Manitoba Coin Club shares rich currency history with rural Manitoba

The Manitoba Coin Club is heading back on the road with a renewed mission to promote numismatics in communities across rural Manitoba.

Numismatics — the study and collection of currency, including coins, tokens, paper money and medals — is one of the world's oldest hobbies. Since 1954, the Manitoba Coin Club has brought collectors together to share in that passion. Over its 70-year history, the club has hosted two national conventions and remains a hub for currency collectors across the province.

"We're always working to expand interest and awareness, especially outside Winnipeg," said Larry Dalman of the Manitoba Coin Club. "Bringing our spring coin shows to rural communities has really helped us connect with a wider audience."

That rural outreach began in 2023, when the club hosted its first-ever Spring Coin Show outside the city — at the Red Barn in the RM of Rockwood. With strong local promotion, including stories in the *Stonewall Teulon Tribune*, the event drew hundreds of visitors from the Interlake and southern Manitoba.

"People came who had never heard of the club but were already collectors in their own way," Dalman said. "They brought coins and bills to learn more about them, to get appraisals, and to buy pieces to build their collections."

Encouraged by the turnout, the club brought its 2024 Spring Show to Steinbach, again reaching new hobbyists through local media and community interest.

A popular highlight at each show is the Royal Canadian Mint's coin exchange booth, where attendees can trade cash for five newly minted commemorative coins at face value. Visitors also receive two free passes for a tour of the mint's Winnipeg facility.

"Having the mint attend our shows adds a huge draw," Dalman said. "People get a chance to collect brand new coins and see where they're made."

This year's spring coin show will take place in Morden on Saturday, May 31 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Morden Access Event Centre (111-D Gilmour St.). The Royal Canadian Mint will be on site for the full event, offering its coin exchange and sharing insight into Canada's coin-making process.

The outreach comes as the club prepares for a major milestone — hosting the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association's 2026 Convention and Numismatic Show from July 14 to 19 at the Fairmont Hotel in Winnipeg. That same year, the Winnipeg mint will celebrate its 50th anniversary.

"The mint is a global leader in coin

production, making currency for around 80 countries, not just Canada," said Dalman. "It's fitting that Winnipeg will host the national show during such a major anniversary."

Dalman noted that numismatics is more than just collecting — it's a window into the past.

"Coins and currency tell stories," he said. "They've been used for trade, for propaganda, even as emergency money in wartime."

In 17th-century New France, for instance, a shortage of coins led officials to issue playing cards marked with monetary values as temporary promissory notes. During the Second World War, resistance forces in Norway smuggled currency plates out of the country so allies could print banknotes to support underground movements. And during the fur trade era, beaver pelts were exchanged for goods, with token systems used by companies like the Hudson's Bay Company.

"People don't realize how much history is sitting in their pockets or tucked into a drawer at home," Dalman said. "Numismatics helps bring that history to life."

The Manitoba Coin Club continues to welcome new members of all ages. Monthly meetings, educational sessions and public shows offer opportunities to learn, trade and build collections.

"We invite anyone with an interest in coins or currency to stop by the show in Morden," Dalman said. "It's a great way to get started or to connect with others who share the same passion."

Wildfire danger high in parts of Manitoba, evacuation orders remain

While wildfires in Nopiming and Whiteshell provincial parks remain active and out of control, Manitoba Parks says firefighting progress has allowed one more area in the northern Whiteshell to reopen.

As of 9 a.m. on Sunday, May 25, permanent residents, cottagers, commercial operators and daytime visitors are permitted to return to the Pointe du Bois area. Provincial Road 313, which leads into the community, is also reopening.

The province is warning that despite this limited reopening, wildfire activity remains high across eastern Manitoba, and those returning to the area must be ready to evacuate with little notice. Officials recommend preparing an emergency go kit in case of a sudden evacuation. More information is available online at www.gov. mb.ca/emo/guide/individuals.


A state of local emergency remains in place for Nopiming, Wallace Lake, South Atikaki and Manigotagan River provincial parks, all of which remain fully closed to the public. That includes all cottage subdivisions, commercial areas, campgrounds, trails, beaches and backcountry canoe

A state of local emergency also continues for Whiteshell Provincial Park, where only limited areas are accessible. Manitoba Parks says decisions to reopen additional areas will be based on daily assessments of wildfire behaviour, fire suppression efforts, weather conditions and expert judgment from wildfire officials.

Two of the largest and most complex fires currently burning in the province are Fire E061 in the Nopiming area and Fire E063 in the Whiteshell. Both are expected to remain active due to hot, dry weather conditions and no significant precipitation in the


Manitoba Parks and the Manitoba Wildfire Service are jointly evaluating ongoing threats and response efforts across multiple eastern parks, including Pinawa Dam and Whitemouth.


All campgrounds in Whiteshell Provincial Park remain closed, both to minimize traffic in case further evacuations are needed and to allow campground staff to assist in emergency operations. This includes all seasonal

and nightly campsites. The province has cancelled all reservations through May 29 and is contacting affected campers via email. The closure may be extended depending on how the wildfire situation evolves.

All hiking trails and water routes in the Whiteshell remain closed, and all forms of backcountry travel are currently prohibited.

In addition, a full fire ban is in effect for all provincial parks in Manitoba. No open fires of any kind are permitted, including those in approved fire pits, at any time of day. The use of charcoal briquettes is also banned. Gas appliances such as propane barbecues and stoves are allowed. Fireworks and sky lanterns are prohibited across all parks.

Manitoba Parks says it understands many people are eager to return to cottages and recreational areas, especially as summer approaches, but public safety remains the highest priority. Officials urge all Manitobans to respect closures and restrictions to ensure the safety of residents, emergency crews and visitors.

FIRE CONCERNS ARE NOT LIMITED TO PARKLAND

The provincial government continues to put restrictions on fires and motorized back-country travel as wildfire danger levels and ongoing human-caused wildfires continue to threaten parts of Manitoba.

The province offers an interactive fire map showing which areas are under a burn ban. It also offers specific burn ban information by individual municipality.

People living in the Interlake are advised to check with their respective municipalities to see what restrictions are in place regarding bonfires, burn barrels, fireworks and motorized travel (e.g., ATVs and other recreational vehicles) in back-country areas.

According to the province's Municipal Burning Restrictions Map, Interlake municipalities have burn bans in effect. Some RMs have instituted a total fire and motorized-vehicle ban while others have partial restrictions (map and corresponding information viewed late Sunday afternoon, May 25).

Passing of the torch: WCI track record stays in the family

For 28 years, the Corbett name topped the 3000-metre leaderboard at Warren Collegiate and it still does, thanks to a remarkable family moment on the track.

Last Thursday at the Zone V Track and Field Championships in Stonewall, Grade 12 student Ethan Corbett broke the school's long-standing record in the 3000m — a mark set in 1997 by his father, Scott Corbett, who was there to witness the torch pass to the next generation.

In 1997, Warren Wildcats' Scott Corbett set the school record of 9:42.21 in the 3000 metre.

Fast forward to last Thursday's Zone 5 Track and Field Meet at Collège Stonewall Collegiate, Scott Corbett was in attendance when his record finally fell at the hands of Grade 12 student Ethan Corbett, Scott's very own son.

"It was awesome," said Ethan Corbett. "My whole high school career of running track I've been trying to break that record and it's taken me four years and a lot of runs to get there but, yeah, it was an awesome feeling finally breaking it and he really wanted me to beat it too. He was motivating me. He says, 'replace me on that, you replace me on that board."

Ethan officially ran a 9:37.08, which beat out his dad by over five seconds.

Following the run, the two shared a passing of the torch moment together.

"My record was going to be broke at some point," said Scott Corbett. "I heard years ago that you should try to raise the next generation to be better than yourself so I was glad to see it broke and have Ethan be the one to do it. The 3000m is a tough race. Nice to see Ethan could achieve his goal on setting a new record as he has put hard work in at practic-

es and meets for cross-country and track over the vears to do so."

"Breaking the record was one thing but having it be my dad, that was just the best thing especially now to keep it in the family name and pass it along," said Ethan Corbett. "It was a great moment to share with him and, yeah, Stonewall too. I like that track. I've been running there since Grade 5, and he'd come and watch me a couple times throughout then so that was the spot to do it."

Also in attendance to congratulate Ethan was Scott's former track coach, Rene Comeault, who is currently a substitute teacher at WCI and was helping run the meet and had also helped out with coaching the team this year.

Knowing that this year was the last chance to break the record, Ethan knew he needed to do a lit-

He said he trained the same amount but had also grown taller since coming within 10 seconds of beating the record last year.

With great running conditions on Thursday, Ethan was able to put forth the record setting performance. He also gave props to his WCI track and field coach.

"I wouldn't have been able to break that without the help of my coach, Fallon Campbell," he said.

Ethan not only won the 3000m event but also took first place in the 1500m, 800m and a relay — all events he also won last year.

His finishes contributed to Warren Collegiate Institute winning the AA–AAA banner for most team points in their category.

Next, Ethan will turn his focus to the 2025 Manitoba High Schools Athletic Association Provincial Track and Field Championships, where he placed sixth in the 3000m a year ago.

Pauls living out childhood dream as youngest member of Team Canada NextGen

Liam Pauls is getting ready to live out his childhood dream later this summer.

Fresh off a U SPORTS national championship with the Brandon University Bobcats, the Balmoral native earned a coveted spot on Team Canada's NextGen men's volleyball roster, which will compete at the 2025 Pan Am Cup in Mexico from Aug. 24 to Sept. 1.

Pauls, born in 2004, was one of 32 athletes invited to try out for the national program. After a successful camp, the outside hitter secured a spot on the final roster and will wear the Maple Leaf for the first time in his career.

"It means a lot and I know a younger version of myself would be really happy that I made it here," said Pauls, who is currently training in Gatineau, Que., the summer base for Team Canada.

Although he's the youngest player on the team, Pauls will have a familiar connection in fellow Manitoba athlete J.J. Love of Dauphin, who also cracked the roster. The two played key roles in Brandon's historic national title run earlier this year, when the Bobcats defeated the University of Alberta Golden Bears

to claim the program's first U SPORTS championship.

Now, Pauls and Love are stepping into a new level of competition, surrounded by teammates with professional volleyball experience.

"It's cool having guys to learn from and guys that have pro experience under their belts," said Pauls. "It's a lot different from the university atmosphere where I could be a bit more like a go-to guy but now I got to take the role of learning and just being a student of the game a bit more."

Team Canada's summer training schedule is rigorous, with daily sessions leading up to the Pan Am Cup. Pauls said the team treats training like a full-time job.

"You'll clock in for those six hours of practicing, including a lift or so, so there's a lot of things we are doing to get better from that practising standpoint and it being pretty intense," he said. "Then there's also nutrition and making sure you're sleeping right, recovering, and all of these little intricacies that we're trying to get better with too."

For the first time ever, Interlake Volleyball Club is a national champion.

Interlake Volleyball Club Tyler defeated the Oceanside Volleyball Club Eagles in straight sets (25-16, 25-19) to win the Tier 10 championship of the 14U Girls Volleyball Canada Youth Nationals on May 11 at the RBC Convention Centre in Winnipeg.

The victory marks the first national title in program history for Interlake Volleyball Club, which is currently in its third season.

Cowan reflects on standout season after WHL finals loss

Tigers defeat Chiefs for franchise's sixth WHL title, will play for Memorial Cup

An incredible playoff run has come to an end for the Spokane Chiefs and goaltender Dawson Cowan.

On May 16, the Chiefs played what would become their final game of the season, falling 4–2 to the Medicine Hat Tigers in Game 5 of the Western Hockey League Championship.

Cowan, of Warren, got the start at Spokane Veterans Memorial Arena with the Chiefs trailing three games to one in the best-of-seven series.

Neither team found the net until Tigers defenceman Niilopekka Muhonen opened the scoring in the second period with a wrister from the point that beat Cowan glove side for his first of the playoffs.

Seventeen-year-old Gavin McKenna extended the Tigers' lead early in the third with his ninth goal of the postseason, followed shortly after by Hunter St. Martin to make it 3–0.

Just under a minute later, the Chiefs responded on the power play with Andrew Cristall's playoff-leading 21st goal. Spokane then pulled within one off a marker from Assanali Sarkenov, making it 3–2 with just over half a period to play.

Scoring was quiet until the final minutes, when Tigers defenceman Bryce Pickford sealed the win with an empty-net goal, securing the sixth Ed Chynoweth Cup in franchise history.

The Tigers have since advanced to the 2025 Memorial Cup, which runs from May 22 to June 1 in Rimouski, Que

As for the Chiefs, their season and remarkable playoff run have come to an end

"We had a really close group of guys," said Cowan. "It was a special team to be part of, and it was pretty fun to come to the rink every day and go to work. It was sad how it ended, but there's a lot to be proud of, and just extremely grateful for the time that we had together and a lot of memories were made."

Cowan, 19, made 32 saves in Game 5, bringing his postseason total to 495 over 19 games.

His 2024–25 campaign saw him elevate his game to new heights, establishing himself as one of the league's top netminders. He finished the playoffs second in goaltender wins, after leading the WHL with 34 victories in the regular season. He was also named a finalist for the Del Wilson Memorial Trophy as WHL Goaltender of the Year.

"I learned a lot this year playing a lot of games but it's just the process," said Cowan. "Just continue to learn to grow and trying to get better every day, but yeah, it was it was a good year and I was grateful to be part of the group that we had there in Spoke."

Looking ahead, Cowan will focus on a productive off-season as he prepares for next year. He is eligible for the 2025 NHL Entry Draft in late June after being passed over in 2024.

His strong showing this season has certainly caught the attention of NHL scouts.
