Sigfusson Northern joins wildfire relief efforts in Cross Lake and Lynn Lake

Wildfires across Manitoba continue to displace communities and threaten infrastructure, prompting relief efforts from local businesses — including Lundar's Sigfusson Northern.

The construction company, which has offices in Lundar and Winnipeg, has mobilized teams to support evacuees and firefighting operations in the north. Through its joint ventures — JNR Construction with Norway House Cree Nation and 311Sig with Mathias Colomb Cree Nation — Sigfusson Northern is providing shelters, supplies and firebreaks to help contain the blazes.

JNR Construction, which has long been active in Norway House, maintains a 62-bed camp for its staff. When Cross Lake residents were evacuated on May 28 due to a road closure on Provincial Road 373, they were redirected to Norway House.

Originally expecting about 1,000 evacuees at the multiplex, the community saw more than 3,000 register that evening. In response, JNR opened its camp to assist.

"When we learned about the evacuation, our team immediately stepped in to provide food, shelter and basic necessities," said Andrew Burdett,



operations manager with Sigfusson Northern.

Led by Sigfusson project manager Jaden McGonigal, the JNR team brought in cooks, cleaners and support staff, assisting more than 100 evacuees each night.

"Everyone was happy to help and stepped up to make sure all the displaced individuals felt comfortable and safe," he said.

Sigfusson Northern also flew in 2,000 pounds of groceries to the camp while it remained operational. Evacuees were later transported by the Canadian Armed Forces to Winnipeg or Thompson.

Burdett said the Province of Manitoba has since asked whether Sigfusson Northern can provide similar camps at other locations. While no final decisions have been made, he said the team is ready to help when called upon.

În Lynn Lake, Sigfusson Northern's joint venture 311Sig has taken a more tactical role. The company is helping to cut firebreaks and protect critical infrastructure, with five employees still on the ground while others were evacuated alongside local residents.

"Working closely with provincial emergency response, 311Sig has rapidly deployed a fleet of heavy equipment and experienced personnel to help contain the wildfire and protect critical infrastructure," said Burdett.

Using D6 dozers, water trucks and other support vehicles, crews have been stripping land of trees and vegetation to block the fire from advancing toward homes, the hospital and the local school. Firefighters are working 12- to 18-hour shifts daily.

"Our guys enjoy the challenge. It

can be exciting but daunting as well," Burdett said. "It's not every day they work under these conditions — relying on direction from fire officials."

Much of that direction comes from the Province of Manitoba's Natural Resources and Northern Development–Wildfire Service Division. However, smoke conditions have occasionally grounded helicopters, making it harder for crews to assess and act.

Despite the challenges, Burdett said 311Sig will continue supporting relief efforts as long as needed.

"311Sig will continue to coordinate closely with the Province of Manitoba and all response partners, contributing all available personnel, equipment and resources in a united effort to protect the community and support its long-term recovery," he said.

The Oak Point Music Festival will strike a heartfelt chord this summer as it honours the region's rich fiddling tradition and the educators who helped it thrive.

Taking place Saturday, July 12 from 11:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Oak Point Sports Grounds, this year's festival will include A Tribute to the Fiddle, Red River Style — a special nod to the St. Laurent School music program and the legacy of its founder, Hugh Sigurdson, and longtime instructor Mark Morriseau.

Over the next 24 years, he taught more than 200 students and helped nurture a vibrant local tradition. Morriseau retired in June 2024, and the program is now led by one of his former students, Jason Appleyard.

Several graduates of the program including Appleyard, the Gaudry Boys, Cameron Ducharme, and Donald and Emma Futros — are featured in the festival's music lineup.

Hosted beneath the towering oak trees of the Oak Point Sports Grounds, where events have been held since 1935, the festival invites guests to tap their feet and take a spin on the out-

door dance floor as the sounds of the fiddle fill the summer air.

At the same time, the vibrant coat embodies the spirit of collaborative





Province launches affordable home energy program

The Manitoba government has launched a new program aimed at helping homeowners lower their energy bills by upgrading to energy-efficient heat pumps, Environment and Climate Change minister Mike Moyes announced last month.

The Affordable Home Energy Program, delivered through Efficiency Manitoba, is a central part of the province's Affordable Energy Plan. It supports families in making energy-saving home upgrades, reduces greenhouse gas emissions and creates jobs in the clean energy sector, said

"This is a big step toward a greener, more sustainable province that is building a low-carbon future by harnessing renewable energy, while making life more affordable for Manitoba families," he said.

Eligible homeowners who heat their homes with electricity could see their energy bills drop by up to 30 per cent approximately \$1,000 in the first year — by switching to a groundsource heat pump.

Efficiency Manitoba CEO Colleen Kuruluk said the program offers a comprehensive efficiency-first approach, guiding homeowners through energy evaluations, insulation upgrades and installation of the right heat pump system.

"We're proud to be part of this important initiative to help Manitobans make smart energy efficiency upgrades that deliver lasting savings and comfort," said Kuruluk.

The program includes flexible participation options, including a no-upfront-cost model that allows families

to begin saving immediately. It also supports retrofits in both single-family homes and multi-unit residential buildings.

Clarence Jonker, president of the Manitoba Geothermal Energy Alliance, said collaboration with industry partners will help ensure the province can meet growing demand with a skilled local workforce.

"Bringing together industry partners to support the Affordable Home Energy Program will help ensure Manitoba is prepared to meet growing demand with a skilled local clean-energy workforce to support reliable and affordable geothermal energy," Jonker said.

MPI files rate hike application for 2026-27 insurance year

Manitoba Public Insurance is seeking a 2.07 per cent increase to basic auto insurance rates for the 2026-27 insurance year, according to a general rate application filed Tuesday with the Public Utilities Board.

If approved, the increase would add about \$21 to the average annual premium for a private passenger vehicle, or roughly \$1.75 per month. The new rates would take effect April 1, 2026.

MPI says rising claim costs — driv-

en by increasingly complex and expensive vehicle technology — are impacting auto insurers across North America.

"While the market remains volatile and the cost of claims continues to rise, this rate request truly emphasizes MPI's commitment to keep auto insurance affordable for all Manitobans," said Satvir Jatana, MPI's president and CEO.

The proposal also includes a change to the Basic deductible, increasing it from \$750 to \$1,000. MPI plans to introduce a new \$750 deductible option under its Extension line of business, which also offers \$200, \$300 and \$500 deductibles.

A two per cent increase to Extension product pricing — covering items like rental vehicle insurance and added third-party liability — is also proposed. Jatana said the changes give customers more flexibility to manage costs while maintaining access to lower-deductible options if they choose.

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
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GIFF prepares for milestone 25th anniversary with bold programming




At the same time, he acknowledged the school staff who remained committed to shaping these young minds throughout their education journey.






































































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Warren's Class of 2025 celebrates achievements and community spirit

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
















































































































Teulon Collegiate grads reflect, celebrate and look ahead










































New memorial award honours young farmer's legacy, supports future in ag

Award created in memory of Clair Bond will support ag students for the next 25 years

A new memorial award is helping keep the legacy of a young farmer alive while supporting the next generation of agriculture professionals in rural Manitoba.

The Clair Bond Agricultural Memorial Award, worth \$5,000, was created in honour of Clair Bond, who died in a tragic car accident in his early 20s. Remembered for his passion for farming and deep ties to his rural community, Bond's friends and family have come together to launch the award in his name.

"I had been juggling the idea around for close to a year now," said Rory Cook, one of Bond's close friends. "Then I got together with a friend, Kyle Willis, and he mentioned it. He said he had thought about doing a scholarship for Clair. It's an opportunity to honour Clair's name."

Cook reached out to Teulon Collegiate guidance counsellor Amanda Okeke to learn how to set up a scholarship from scratch. After several months of discussion, Okeke presented a number of options, and they ultimately decided that Cook, Willis, and a small group of Bond's friends and family would select the recipient each year.

Those involved in both the funding and selection process include Bruce and Donna Bond, Bruce and Leslie Cockerill, the Skinner brothers, Sherry and Mike Persoage, Kevin Bond, Aaron Charison, Charison's Turkey Hatchery, and Glenn and Maureen Kletke.

The award is open to students pursuing postsecondary education in any agriculture-related field, including farming, ag tech, agribusiness and animal sciences. While a single \$5,000 award was presented this year, the fund may be split among multiple recipients in the future. The group has already developed a plan to sustain the award for at least 25 years.

Avery Reed, a graduating student from Teulon Collegiate, was selected as the inaugural recipient of the Clair Bond Agricultural Memorial Award.



Powwow and jamboree honour culture, community and student success

For the first time, Prairie Rose School Division (PRSD) held an Indigenous graduation celebration on June 6, honouring students from across the division with a day filled with culture, community and pride.

The 2025 Celebration Pow Wow & Jamboree, hosted at St. Laurent School, brought together Indigenous, Métis and First Nations graduates for a ceremony that blended traditional teachings, performances and heartfelt words of encouragement.

Master of ceremonies Ray "Coco" Stevenson opened the event by introducing members who performed a pipe ceremony — a sacred practice used by many Indigenous cultures to connect with the Creator, spirit world and nature. It is often used to seek blessings, mark intentions or ask for guidance.

Coco encouraged attendees to live by circle teachings and treat others with respect.

"Never turn your backs on anybody and never leave anyone in the background," he said. "Be respectful to others and to Mother Earth and the spirits that protect the land."

He reminded graduates of the importance of using their voices with

"Choose your words right," he said. "Speak from the heart and don't take

Music by the St. Laurent Fiddlers and dancing by the Little Bitty Steppers and Interlake Steppers followed, leading into a ceremonial grand entry. Graduates were led in by flag bearers St. Laurent Reeve Richard Chartrand and Interlake-Gimli MLA Derek Johnson, dignitaries and PRSD members with drumming by Sons of the Drum and Walking Wolf.

Throughout the event, speakers emphasized both the personal and collective meaning of the milestone — celebrating individual accomplishments while advancing reconciliation and Indigenous visibility in education.

single person here has travelled the same path to get to this moment. You all come with different circumstances, experiences, aptitudes and passions and when you leave here today, you will all take different paths again. You will have the joy of making this life uniquely yours."

MLA Derek Johnson urged graduates to embrace the power of their voice, vote and values.

"Success isn't just about your school achievement; it is about lifting others as we rise," he said. "Your future is unwritten, but your potential is lim-

He also acknowledged the families and educators who supported the graduates along their journeys.

As the final honour song echoed through the gym, families and community members lined up to congratulate each graduate. The energy in the room was one of hope, pride and possibility.

Plans are already underway to make the Indigenous grad celebration an annual event. Organizers say they hope to build on the success of this year's gathering and continue creating space for Indigenous students to be seen, supported and celebrated.

Stonewall boxer stays undefeated with unanimous decision win

Stonewall's Tyler Oleksiuk kept his perfect record intact with a unanimous decision victory over Wrenn Peters on June 14, earning a clean sweep on the judges' scorecards at a boxing event in Beausejour.

The 18-year-old amateur fighter, who trains out of United Boxing Club in Winnipeg, said the three-round bout was his toughest yet.

"Right from the opening bell I realized he was the first left-handed fighter on my resume," said Oleksiuk. "I had to switch the game plan and adjust to his style throughout the entire fight."

Peters entered the ring with twice the number of bouts on his record, making him the most experienced opponent Oleksiuk has faced so far.

"I already had plenty of respect for Wrenn Peters going into the fight," he said. "He gave a great fight for the fans and I'm happy I got to share the ring with him."

To prepare, Oleksiuk extended his training camp and sparred with heavier opponents to simulate size and power mismatches.

"That helped my confidence and strength grow," he said.

The June win was Oleksiuk's second fight in three weeks, part of an active schedule aimed at building experience.

"When I fight it's not only for me, but everybody who's rooting for me," he said. "Having the support from the people closest to me is what gives me the extra push. I believe that's the reason I'm still undefeated to this day."

Oleksiuk said hearing his name announced as the winner brought a wave of "happiness and relief."

"I was confident I had gotten the win, but there's no better feeling than getting your hand raised."

Representing his hometown of Stonewall is something he takes pride in

"I grew up here and to come back to Stonewall after every fight — it's truly a blessing," he said. "Everything I've achieved in my boxing career I owe to United Boxing Club. From our manager, my coaches and all of my teammates — they're truly the best."

Oleksiuk, who's been boxing for three years, credits the sport with teaching him discipline, perseverance and resilience — both physical and mental.

He's eyeing a return to the ring in September and has long-term ambitions of turning professional.

"My goals in boxing for now is just to keep competing and gaining experience," he said. "I can't wait to see where boxing takes me as I further my career in both amateur and eventually professional boxing."

In 1991, she returned to Hunter Memorial Hospital as head nurse, later moving into the Director of Nursing position. From 1991-1997 Mom taught the Teulon Volunteer Ambulance crew in the evening once a week.

In 1998 regionalization took place, the end of the era of Director of Nursing in one facility. She became the Clinical Team Manager over Teulon and Stonewall Hospitals until her retirement in 2016

Community, family and friends were very important to Mom. She was a member of the Balmoral Rec Centre Board, the Teulon & District Handivan Committee and the Southwest Palliative Care Committee

Mom loved having friends over for lunch and afternoon tea. She also looked forward to hosting traditional family gatherings. Family and friends were extremely important to her. They were all

Mom also had a very strong faith all her life. In later years she was a member of the Stonewall Anglican Church. She belonged to the choir and was a member of vestry.


