

Three semis were involved in a highway collision last week that resulted in three tickets for one of the drivers.

On Wednesday, June 28 at about 11:20 a.m., Stonewall RCMP responded to a collision on Highway 7 at Highway 67.

A semi rear-ended a second semi, which then rear-ended a third semi.

The drivers of the first two semis were not injured. The 46-year-old driver of the third semi was taken to hospital for minor injuries.

The driver of the first semi, another 46-year-old man, was issued three tickets under the Highway Traffic Act for failing to produce a licence (\$113), driving carelessly (\$672) and failing to produce an insurance certificate and registration (\$113).

So far this year, 64 people have died in motor vehicle collisions in Manitoba, including the 16 people who died in the collision on June 15. This is much higher than the 34 Manitobans who died on roads at this time last year and well above the current five-year average of 33.

RCMP Sgt. Paul Mainagre stressed the importance of driving sober, wearing a seatbelt, and slowing down and driving to conditions.

He offered advice for keeping safety top of mine while on the roads.

"Be cautious and always aware of your surroundings. Pay attention to the road at all times," he said.


tickets by doing the reading activities in the booklet they receive at registration."

## final tee-off after 25-year run

After 25 years, golfers supporting the Bryan Lefley Memorial Golf Tournament will tee off for one final time on July 7.

Bryan Lefley went to school within the division and grew up in Grosse Isle. He was a dedicated hockey player, learning to skate on local ice, playing his minor hockey in Winnipeg and Warren. He played three years with the Winnipeg Rangers and turned pro in 1969 and was on two CHL Champion teams in Omaha. The defenceman played 228 games in the NHL with seven goals, 29 assists and 36 points before going to Europe. In 1978, Bryan went to play hockey in Europe, and his playing career there developed into a coaching career that ended tragically in 1997 when he died in a car accident in Bolzano, Italy.

"He was a well thought of coach," said Bryan's brother, Chuck Lefley. "He was well-respected."

After Bryan's death, his wife, Marianne, wanted to start a scholarship in his name for students in the Interlake School Division (ISD), paying homage to his upbringing. They created the Bryan Lefley Memorial Scholarship, which was to give \$1,000 to three separate students in the school division each year. Since its start in 1998, the scholarship has granted out \$56,000.

"We thought about that and, well, now you need money," said Chuck. "So, we thought of putting on a golf tournament."

In 1998, the first Bryan Lefley Memorial Golf Tournament was held at the South Interlake Golf Course. That inaugural year, they had 198 golfers.

Since then, there's been around 175 golfers playing in the tournament annually. Eight years ago, the tournament moved to being hosted at Bel Acres Golf & Country Club, where 173 golfers will tee off for the last time ever.

Each year, the tournament raised a different sum of money, coming close to \$10,000 on more than one occasion. Chuck said the profit is dependent on that year's expenses, so as the years went on, it became more and more profitable. In its 25 years, the golf tournament has raised more than \$100,000 for the scholarship fund. The tournament has golf, of course, along with a huge silent auction of donated prizes, some other fundraising things, and a big dinner to end the day.

"The support has been phenomenal," said Chuck. "It's been incredibly well received every year."

The Bryan Lefley Memorial Fund now has enough money in it that the scholarship is guaranteed to carry on forever. It's in the hands of the Interlake Community Foundation. The amount of money each student receives will vary, depending on the interest generated in the fund as that's where the scholarship money comes from.

This year, three ISD students will receive \$1,400 each from the Brian Lefley Memorial Scholarship. South West Palliative Care will also get a donation of \$750 this year from the fund. The scholarship is for graduating students who are well-rounded, meaning they receive good grades, are involved in the community, play sports of some kind and are going to continue their



education after high school.

Because the memorial fund is now guaranteed to support the scholarship for evermore, 2023 will be the last year for the golf tournament.

"We're sad it's got to end but all good things have to end eventually, don't they?" said Chuck.

The tournament was always more than a day affair for the Lefley family. As it was so big, people came from across the country to play in it and support it, so Chuck said they were always hosting people for over a week. Along with that, the event took endless time to organize each year, being a commitment for friends and family alike in support of Bryan. He's looking forward to having some more time in the summer now.

"The Interlake Community Foundation is now going to take good care of our money and good care of our kids," he said.



### **Statement from Finance Minister Cliff Cullen on Tax Freedom Day**

For the second consecutive year, the Fraser Institute has named Manitoba the No. 1 province for Tax Freedom Day, the day of the year when the average individual has earned enough money to pay their taxes. For 2023, Manitoba reached that day on June 6, ahead of all other provinces.

Whether it is filling up the gas tank, buying groceries or cooling a home, the purchases Manitobans make daily are becoming more expensive. As Manitobans continue to face a rising cost of living, providing historic help to make life more affordable for Manitobans remains of critical importance to the Manitoba government.

Introduced in Budget 2023, new and enhanced tax measures will bring Manitoba's personal income taxes in line with other provinces. The changes in personal income tax will allow families to keep more of their income and will attract interprovincial migration to grow the economy.

Incremental savings from all tax breaks, school tax rebates and affordability payments from 2022 to 2024 will total more than \$1.8 billion. That is more than \$5,500 for an average two-income family.

A reduction to Manitoba Hydro fees will have a favourable effect on electricity rates and save ratepayers \$190 this year and more than \$4 billion over the next 20 years. Manitoba Hydro's rate application to the Public Utilities Board is now only an increase of two per cent over each of

the next two years, compared to the proposed 3.5 per cent rate increase.

addition, In starting on July 1, Manitobans will see an increase in take-home pay on paycheques due to the largest ever enhancement to the basic person-

If you are sensing the reality that the world cannot offer you the stable happiness vou desire, vou must turn to God, especially seeing what He has accomplished in Jesus Christ. By turning from your sin and putting your faith in Jesus Christ, God offers you Himself as a stable, perfect and infinite source of happiness in our broken world. 

steadily for over two years.




Also in their speech, the valedictori-

## Ryan Ritchie wins Quarry Run 5K with personal best time

The Inaugural JO Massage - Stonewall Quarry Run was a success in every way. Registration was 50 per cent higher than expected and all events ran without incident.

Local runners were well represented at the event, with Ryan Ritchie of Stonewall winning men's 5K with a personal best time of 18:43 and well ahead of the 5K field. Other notable runs came from Myles Willis of Complete Physiotherapy in Stonewall with a very impressive 41:45 in the 10K, holding off Matthew Nelson of Fisher River 42:47 and good enough for second place behind the fierce pace of David Snider from Winnipeg, who posted a course record time of 34:29 that will likely stand for a very long time.

Joanne Haas and Khadija Samoila of Winnipeg were first and second respectively for the 10K women with Stonewall's Bev Hidlebaugh rounding out the Top 3. While Ritchie dominated the men's 5K, Tracey Dixon posted a winning time of 22:24 in the women's 5K, 23 seconds ahead of the second place male Jamie Barnabe 22:47 of Grande Point, followed by Blaine Hintz 24:19 of Brandon who held off Andy Stoecklin, Jordan Booth and Tanner Booth of Stonewall, who where only about one minute back. Stella Buzinis of Headingley won second place in the women's 5K, with Annika Stamm of Stonewall less than a minute back for third place overall.

The 2K overall winner was Kaitlyn Dixon-Hayes of Winnipeg with a time of 10:39, and Joanne Reimer crossing the finish line with Kaylene Reimer of Balmoral and Stonewall respectively completing the Top 3 females. The top three males were Novak Kalem of Winnipeg, Jackson Oatway of Stony Mountain and Payton Jones of Winnipeg, all within a few seconds of each

other. "Most of the runners praised the run course for its condition and flow despite having to climb Jimm's Hill so early in the race," said organizer Dwayne Olson.

A typical running event is planned over a year, but the Quarry Run was proposed in March of 2021 by a group 17 Wing Triathlon Club members. The Stonewall Quarry Run was even planned with a new mascot (Terrydactyl) and shiny new finisher medals. Excitement started to percolate in the running community as the race sold out in about two weeks. However, that event was ultimately shut down by the provincial government because of the COVID pandemic and was not proposed again until this spring when a cancellation on the Manitoba Runners' Association schedule provided an opportunity to resurrect the event that never happened in 2021.

Because most of the planning had already occurred, three months was enough time to plan logistics but not enough time to get on the radar of most competitive road runners, according to Dwayne Olson. With that said, based on similar recent events in Stony Mountain, the event was expected to attract about 50 registrants. By race day, 75 participants had registered.



The challenge then became recruiting enough volunteers to provide the proper support at the various intersections throughout the course. The Interlake Thunder Women's Football Team came in to save the event.

Season pork chops with 3/4 teaspoon salt and black pepper, to taste.

Heat grill or grill pan to medium-high heat. Grill pork chops until browned, about 5 minutes. Flip and cook 5-6 minutes until food thermometer inserted in center registers 135 F.Transfer to plate and rest at least 5 minutes until internal temperature rises to 145-160 F. Gently stir peaches, pecans, onion, basil, jalapeno, lime juice and remaining salt. Add salsa on top of each pork chop

with remaining salsa on side.


