COVID booster shots recommended for fall; Doctors Manitoba revises procedure backlog

With the COVID-19 virus continuing to mutate and gaining traction in some parts of Canada, Canada's National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) is recommending the administration of an mRNA booster shot this fall.

For some people, an additional shot of vaccine could constitute their third, fourth or fifth dose

The recommendation comes after an expected resurgence of COVID in the fall and the possibility of stressing the health-care system.

"The likelihood, timing and severity of a future wave of COVID-19 is uncertain; however, the later fall and winter months are expected to be associated with a resurgence of SARS-CoV-2 community transmission due to indoor and seasonal gatherings," states NACI in a June 29 guidance report. "Later fall and winter is also a time when the incidence rates of other respiratory diseases are elevated, which leads to increased pressure on health systems."

It recommends that individuals aged 12 to 64 years of age be offered a fall COVID booster vaccination "regardless of the number of booster doses previously received." And it strongly recommends that the fall booster dose be given to the following:

- People 65 years of age and older
- People living in long-term care or congregate living facilities
- Children 12 years of age and older with an underlying medical condition
- Adults living in First Nations, Métis, and Inuit communities
- Adults in racialized communities and/or marginalized communities (e.g., people living with disabilities)
 - People 12 years and older

who are living in congregate settings such as quarters for migrant workers, shelters, correctional facilities and group homes.

NACI said the omicron subvariants BA4 and BA5 "continue to grow" in Canada while previous omicron subvariants, such as BA2, are on the decline.

In addition to the rise of the latest subvariants - which can evade natural or vaccine-induced immunity and are even more contagious than previous omicron lineages – the proportion of people who've received at least one additional dose of vaccine has "plateaued" and "infection- and/or vaccine-acquired immunity wanes over time."

With regard to adverse side effects of [additional] mRNA booster doses, NACI said health risks are unknown in the case of some serious complications because they've been administered to a limited subset of the population, such as long-term care residents, and the monitoring of vaccine safety is ongoing.

"Booster doses were well tolerated

and no new safety signal was identified. However, second booster doses have generally been administered in specific populations (e.g., LTC residents, older adults) or in small groups, therefore evidence of their safety is currently limited," states NACI. "The risk of myocarditis and/ or pericarditis [inflammation of the heart / inflammation of the lining of the heart] following the first booster dose was lower compared to dose 2 of the primary series, which is consistent with lower risk due to extended intervals between doses. The risk of myocarditis and/or pericarditis associated with additional doses is currently unknown."

Many of the COVID vaccines approved by Health Canada are associated with a risk of serious health complications – including death – which include thrombosis (blood clots), thrombocytopenia (low platelets in blood), capillary leak syndrome, Guillain-Barre syndrome (the immune system attacks the nerves and can paralyse the entire body) and Bell's Palsy





A New Life with us > FAITH

Saturday June 25th, I had a very unique pastoral experience. I performed a wedding ceremony at New Life Church, Stonewall and did it in two different languages: English and Ukrainian.

About a month before, I met Rachel and Steve Clark from New Life and they told about a Ukrainian couple the church was sponsoring to come to Stonewall. They said the couple, Ivan and Violetta, had been planning to get married in Ukraine but then the war happened. Rachel, knowing that I am able to speak Ukrainian, asked if I would be willing to perform the ceremony, which was to be livestreamed back to Ivan and Violetta's families in Ukraine. I immediately said yes.

The ceremony was in English and Ukrainian. We had a translator for most of it, but I did the Introduction and the Conclusion, in both languages. The funny part was telling Ivan, in the Conclusion, in English, to kiss Violetta (which he did) and then telling him again in Ukrainian (which he again gladly did!)

I met with Ivan and Violetta sev-

eral times to plan the wedding and I discovered that both are fine bornagain Christians and had been part of a great church in Ukraine.

And it was amazing to hear how they had gotten here. They had been on a ski trip in Poland, having left Kiev on Monday, February 21, planning to return Friday, February 25th when Russia invaded Ukraine. On Wednesday, February 23rd, Violetta got a call from her brother telling her they should not try to come back to Ukraine.

As result, in Poland, they applied to come to Canada and were able to do so, largely through the work of the folks at New Life Stonewall.

At the wedding, it was moving to hear Ivan thank everyone, saying how grateful he was for everything the folks at New Life had done. He said because of New Life that they were able to begin a "new life" in Canada.

I was so happy I could do my part to help a young couple, traumatized by war, in their new life.

(facial paralysis). The World Health Organization and researchers have also reported on multi-thousands of cases of tinnitus and hearing loss.

Health Canada has instructed vaccine manufacturers to list some warnings on their product monographs. The health agency maintains that the benefits of COVID vaccines outweigh the risks of the disease.

A total of 85,133,726 vaccine doses have been administered in Canada as of May 27, according to the federal government. Adverse health events have been reported by 46,635 (about 6 in 10,000) people. Of those 46,635 reports, 9,627 were considered serious.

Other health news:

-The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority's medical officer of health declared a COVID-19 outbreak June 27 at the Betel Personal Care Home in Selkirk.

"General visitation is suspended and outbreak protocols are in place," states a notice on the IERHA's website. The number of infected people was not provided.

-The provincial government's weekly COVID surveillance report for the week June 19-25 shows 157 new cases of COVID. The volume of restricted PCR lab tests for the virus decreased from the previous week's report. Provincial data is an undercount of the true number of infections.

There were also 46 new hospital admissions for the virus, of which five people required intensive care treatment, and one death was reported.

Manitoba's COVID death toll now stands at 2,043, an increase of 18

deaths from the previous week's death toll of 2,025.

-In its COVID-19 Weekly Epidemiological Update published June 29, the World Health Organization reported that the number of weekly cases "has increased for the third consecutive week, after a declining trend since the last peak in March 2022." The countries with the highest numbers of new weekly cases are the U.S., Germany, Brazil, Italy and China.

-Doctors Manitoba revised its estimate of the backlog of surgical and diagnostics procedures. As of June 28, there are between 107,111 and 130,449 procedures in the queue. The organization reported over 166,000 procedures at the end of May.

"The new estimate focuses on the work required to clear the backlog, rather than tabulating the procedures missed during the pandemic as some of those procedures are no longer required," states the physician advocacy organization on its website.

Some patients no longer need a test or a procedure because their condition has either improved or deteriorated, they died while waiting or they moved away, states Doctors Manitoba. And "alternative and sometimes less ideal tests or treatments were used instead."

-The Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) reported 43 additional cases monkeypox last week for a total of 278 cases as of June 29. Quebec has reported 202 cases, Ontario, 67, Alberta, five, and British Columbia, four. There was a total of 235 cases reported as of June 24.

-The World Health Organization has confirmed 3,413 cases of monkeypox and one death from 50 countries/territories between Jan. 1 and June 22. The majority of laboratory confirmed cases were reported from the WHO's European Region at 86 per cent, followed by the Region of the Americas at 11 per cent and the African Region at two per cent.





The trio thanked family and friends for their support along the way and explained that the pandemic has also taught students to have a deeper appreciation for one another and how to cherish time with friends and family.


"Because of our long separation, we learned to value each other and cherished our time together for our last year," McGuirk said.

them. The most important lesson they learned in the last for years, they said, is how to overcome the challenges they've faced.




"In terms of citizenship, this year's recipient has been a very positive role model through her years here at Teulon Collegiate and in the Teulon community," Campbell added.












































































StoryWalk program underway in Stonewall

This summer, you can take a stroll and enjoy an entertaining story in the great outdoors.

The Stonewall library is presenting the StoryWalk Program, created by Anne Ferguson of Montpelier, Vt., and developed in collaboration with the Kellogg Hubbard Library.

"StoryWalk is a wonderful way for everyone to enjoy reading and the outdoors at the same time. In our Story Walk project, laminated pages from a children's book are attached to corplast board, which are then installed along an outdoor path," explained Joan Ransom, Stonewall branch librarian.

"As you stroll down the trail, you're directed to the next page in the story." StoryWalks have been installed over 13 countries, including Germany, U.S., England, Bermuda, Russia, Malaysia, Pakistan and South Korea, she added.


"We are so excited to be sharing this program with our community. We have long wanted to do this and were so fortunate this year to qualify for a grant from the Healthy Together Now Program of the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority," Ransom said.

"We had great support from the Town of Stonewall, and Brett Chatfield was so helpful with advice on planning our routes and securing the stakes for our corplast boards. The Association of Community Living Interlake is also a project partner, and Tracy Fidler was a terrific resource on how we could make the StoryWalk more accessible for all."

A group effort went into implementing the project, which launches this week with the first story.


"We have recorded the stories and have created QR codes that are linked to each page in case anyone wants to use their mobile device to listen to the story along the walk. Our library clerk Stella McAuley has spent weeks preparing the books, creating the QR codes and getting this project ready to go," Ransom said.


"To comply with copyright law, we must use the original pages of the book, so we purchased several

copies of each title, took the book spine off and laminated two pages per board."

Throughout the summer, a new path and story will be featured every two weeks.

"We are featuring four routes and four stories over the summer," Ransom said.

"We tried to choose titles that included themes of refugees, Indigenous culture, French language and inclusivity."

Route 1 will be on the path between Oak Bay and Gray Street (heading toward Archie Gray Park) from July 3 to 16 featuring the story *Our World is a* Family by Miry Whitehill and Jennifer Jackson.

Route 2 will be along the sidewalk on Fifth Avenue South on the southside of the Veterans Memorial Sports Complex soccer fields from July 17 to 30 featuring the story Sometimes I Feel Like a Fox by Danielle Daniel.

Route 3 will be on the path between Procure Drive and Stoneridge Drive from July 31 to Aug. 13. The featured story those weeks will be a bilingual story in English and French called Cousins Forever/Cousines Pour Toujours by Elisavet Arkolaki and Charikleia Arkolaki.

The fourth and final route will be along the path on Fifth Street W. in front of Stonewall Collegiate Institute featuring the story Wildflower by

Melanie Brown.

If any pages go missing or if any boards fall down, community members can call the library at 204-467-8415 to let the library staff know.

"At the end of each story, there will be a small notebook that we hope people will sign and let us know that they read the story. We encourage people to leave comments and let us know what they think of the project and any ideas they have on how we can make it better," Ransom said.

"We hope readers get outside and enjoy some stories out in the sunshine. And remember — the minutes that readers spend reading the StoryWalk stories count toward our summer reading program, Mermaid Tales. So be sure to log those minutes on your reading log!"


