Brivnica Co Barbershop in the giving spirit

Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes available for pick up until mid November

Brooke (Rogoza) Krasnesky's road to being a hairstylist has not always been easy, but her business, Brivnica Co The Barbershop Company, shows what hard work and perseverance can do.

The young stylist started her professional career a decade ago and hasn't stopped for a second to give up on her dream, even when things got tough.

In 2017, when she was 18, she went to the Salon Professional Academy in Winnipeg. Shortly after that, her grandpa died on her birthday, and she was diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis in her knees and ankles, which made it hard to stand.

"It was a pretty hard go trying to get through school," said Krasnesky.

Since she graduated, Krasnesky has always been out on her own, pursuing her career in hairstyling.

In May 2022, she opened her business, renting off Deb's Hair Design on the corner of the street, and when she and her husband got married in May, they decided to upgrade their building and got 312 Main St.

But Krasnesky's ideas and aspirations for her career haven't stopped — she is looking to give back to a community she feels has given so much to her.

And that's a part of why she loves doing what she does. Krasnesky says her favourite thing about owning her own business and cutting hair, in general, is how she can help others.


"It's the satisfaction you get of making somebody happy," she said.

Krasnesky wants to give back in a bigger way this Christmas season through her initiative, Christmas shoeboxes for charity and a special potluck with gifts and free haircuts on Christmas Eve.

Krasnesky was raised in faith, which plays a huge part into her giving heart.

"Growing up, giving back and whatnot, always thanking God. If it weren't for God, I wouldn't be here and where I am right now."

This year, the couple have decided to support Samaritan's Purse for Operation Christmas Child.

Krasnesky ordered a bunch of shoeboxes so other children who come in the barbershop can pick up a shoebox and fill it up for another child. The deadline to fill the shoeboxes is the second week of November.

"It's filling a hole in your heart by giving to people that don't have as much as you have," she said.

The other way Krasnesky hopes to give back to the community this Christmas is through a fundraiser through GoFundMe that will raise funds to provide a potluck on Christmas Eve for the community at the barbershop.

If she and her husband Austin can raise enough,

they also want to use the money to get Christmas gifts and wrap them to give to the children in Stonewall.

To make these dreams a reality, they are hoping to raise \$5,000 to \$10,000 before the week prior to Christmas Eve. Krasnesky will also be offering free haircuts that day.

"One day, I was just sitting in the shop and felt called in my heart to do a GoFundMe for the shop, for the shop to give back to the community," she said.

She said she still wants to provide free haircuts if they cannot raise all the funds but hopes that they can do it for the community.

"It's home. ... The community is important to me, growing up here. A lot of my clients are people I went to school with or their parents, their grandparents or their kids. Their family. You know these people, and you have

your heart for them,

Balmoral fundraiser will feature beer, music and prizes

A fundraising evening is about to take flight in Balmoral.

On Saturday, Nov. 4, the Balmoral Community Hall is hosting a Flight Night Fundraiser from 7:30 p.m. to midnight.

All proceeds will go towards the ongoing operation and continuous improvement of the community hall.

"This is our first fundraiser in a couple years at least, so it's an important event for us," said Doug Carter, who serves on the Balmoral Community Hall board with his wife Lisa.

"We've recently done a bunch of renovations, so it's looking nicer and fresher. The facility is quite a bit improved, which is exciting, but we also need to replenish the coffers a little bit now."

The fundraising event will feature door prizes, a 50/50 draw and a cash bar featuring craft beers by Good Neighbour Brewing and Kilter Brewing Company. For non-beer drinkers, there will be options of a cider, a non-alcoholic beer, canned soda and water.

"It's an opportunity to get quarter-servings of eight beers and one cider. You can pick your poisons to try



out and then you can buy full beers once you're happy with the choice — or keep drinking small ones," Carter said.

"There's going to be a warm snack provided by Lavender Farms that is included in admission. There will also be additional food available for purchase."

A live band called Heartsleeve will entertain the crowds, featuring Gareth McNichol-Briggs on banjo and lead vocals, Mike Chaput on bass and vocals, Greg Fehr on guitar and vocals, Mike Erb on mandolin and pedal steel and Ryan Woods on drums.

"It's folk music turned upside down. We all come from different genres and backgrounds, like our bass player really likes funk music and soul mu-

sic, our drummer likes jazz and I'm a metal head. There's more to music than just

sound — there's the feeling and all these other aspects," said McNich-ol-Briggs, who teaches music classes in Teulon.

"We have fun and enjoy what we're playing — and we want people to enjoy what we're playing too. We're definitely not stuck in one genre. I feel like we're five different misfits that all work together. We really enjoy doing it. I hope people leave feeling filled up and warm."

As for the Balmoral Community Hall board, they also hope that at-

tendees will enjoy the outing.

"We're really hoping for a good turnout. This is a chance for people to come out and be reacquainted with the facility," Carter said.

"We also have new families who have moved into the area, and some of them might never have set foot in the hall. We're hoping they will come have a look and have a fun evening."



New appointments to MPI board announced

The Manitoba government has appointed a new board of directors for Manitoba Public Insurance (MPI) in an effort to resume services and return financial accountability to the Crown corporation, Justice Minister Matt Wiebe, minister responsible for MPI, announced last week.

"We are acting quickly to appoint a proven team of leaders dedicated to setting a new direction and preserving our public auto insurance model," said Wiebe. "There is a clear need for oversight, accountability and a new relationship with employees, and I am confident that this board has the experience and ability to find that

MPI's 1,700 employees have been on strike since Aug. 28 and an overhaul of the corporation's technology systems has nearly tripled in cost to nearly \$300 million, said the minister. The organization is also currently undergoing an external organizational review, noted Wiebe.

The new board of directors will be chaired by Carmen Nedohin, former chairperson of the Manitoba Liquor Control Commission and a former Manitoba Hydro board member. Nedohin will be supported by several former MPI employees as well as labour and community leaders, and experts in asset management, information technology and actuarial science.

The board's top priority will be to resolve the current strike with an agreement that is both fair to employees and responsible to Manitoba ratepayers, noted Wiebe.

"I am excited to start working with the board and want to thank all members for accepting this responsibility," said Wiebe. "This board will stay on top of operations and provide the oversight required to return MPI to its once great status as a leader in the field providing Manitobans with affordable insurance."

MPI administers the Drivers and Vehicles Act on behalf of the Manitoba government and provides driver licensing and vehicle registration functions under the act. Its primary purpose is to administer the basic compulsory, universally available auto insurance program. MPI also offers optional expanded-benefits auto insurance for all Manitobans and auto insurance for fleets based in Manitoba. This year, its 50th year in operation, MPI administered more than 1.25 million policies and handled more than 260,000 claims.





Watch your speed — council passed second and third readings to amend the reduced speed zone bylaw.

Now all roadways in Quarry Park will have a speed limit of 20 kilometres per hour all year round.

IN OTHER COUNCIL NEWS:

- Council passed second and third readings to amend a bylaw related to municipal bylaw enforcement to now include a new firearms bylaw
- CJ Butcher would like to expand his skate sharpening and pro shop business at Veterans Memorial Sports Complex. The mayor and CAO will execute a lease agreement

between the town and CJ Butcher for the expanded space.

- The mayor and CAO will execute a memorandum of understanding with the RM of Rockwood to provide emergency action in support of each other when affected or threatened by a peacetime emergency.
- The town will restrict parking on Dec. 1 for the Annual Stonewall Chamber Festival of Lights Parade. Parking will be restricted on Main Street from 4th Avenue North to the Veterans Memorial Sports Complex parking lot from 5 to 8:30 p.m. Main Street will be closed in the same area from 6 to 8:30 p.m. In addition, 2nd Avenue North will be closed from 2nd Street East to Main Street between 6 and 8 p.m.



Lessons from a legend ... learning with Kurt Browning

It's not every day you meet one of your idols, much less spend a whole day with them.

Such was the case for three of Stone-wall's brightest young figure skaters — Cameron Nesbitt, Gaia Turner and Lacey Learning — who twirled, jumped and carved their way around the ice with four-time world champion Kurt Browning on Oct. 14.

It was an eight-hour affair, as Browning — who the girls know best for his time in Stars on Ice — critiqued a group of sprouting talent, shared some words of wisdom with each skater and their parents and even showed off a few moves of his own to remind everyone he's still got it at 57 years old.





Gaia Turner, 11, has been figure skating for three years and said she wants to compete in the Olympics one day.

"It was really fun," said Nesbitt, 15. "He has a very bubbly personality so he was able to make everything fun. We were doing some really simple things like cross-cuts and he made them interesting. He gave lots of tips on how to make them better and he also just said, 'You don't have to do this in your normal skating but it's just a way to make your skating better.'

"He understood that not everybody is going to listen to exactly what he says."

Nesbitt, who was born into a family of skaters — her dad and brother on the hockey rink and her mom a fellow figure skater — relished the opportunity to pick Browning's brain.

"He told us a bit about what he did

before competitions or before he went and skated. One of the things he did was he would find a clear spot on the ice and he would do six inside edges and try his best to line them all on top of each other, and it really just helped his mind prepare and get going. That was really interesting to try and hear about," she said.

The trio, who all skate out of the Stonewall Skating Club twice a week, each took away something different from the seminar.

"We did a lot of yoga and cardio and we did a lot of skating with Kurt," said Turner, 11. "We did a lot of footwork that he's famous for. He showed us a triple-axel and then we did some jumps and spins."

Though Turner did not attempt to replicate Browning's triple-axel jump, she did pick up some tips on how to sharpen her own axel.

Turner is just in her third year of figure skating, having laced up skates for hockey in her younger years. But it wasn't long before she found herself longing for a crack at figure skating.

"I saw a bunch of figure skaters and I just kept doing spins during hockey practice so then my mom kind of just led me to figure skating," she said. "I love it, so much more than hockey."

Meanwhile, Learning was able to take away some tips as a skater and a teacher. The 11-year-old is in just her third year of figure skating but is already paying it forward through the local CanSkate program, which works with children ages three to 12

on improving their skating.

"It was a really fun day. I didn't know what to expect but Kurt was a very kind and normal person," Learning said. "Kurt taught me to focus on perfecting the little things like keeping your head up and smiling and standing up straighter."

During an off-ice portion of the seminar, Browning hosted a Q and A with the group of moms in attendance. Much of his message focused on protecting the girls' mental health as they continue in the sport.

Browning emphasized the importance of each skater forgiving themselves for their mistakes on the ice and not focusing on what they can't do but rather on what they can do.

Certainly, it's something Nesbitt, Turner and Learning will need to keep in mind as they each expect to be on the ice for a long time.

"I've been doing it long enough that I really enjoy it, but also I would always love to get up to a high competitive level, but even if I can't do that, I just love to go out and skate every week," Nesbitt said.

Learning added: "I mean, there's no (real good) way to explain it. I just really like the feeling of being on the ice."

Turner concluded: "I just love skating with my friends and doing new things every time with my coaches," she said. "I'm not sure if it'll come true but I really want to go to the Olympics."






