
The Foot Shop stocks high quality shoes, boots, sandals and running




Stonewall elementary school students decorated a pair of shoes that journeyed to Parliament Hill.

## Inwood woman wins free groceries for a year

### Grocery contest rewards customers for shopping local

An Inwood woman has won free groceries for a year.

After almost exclusively shopping at The Grocery People (TGP) in Teulon for two months, Carla A'Bear won free groceries for a year, thanks to the chain's Scratch, Snap and Win contest.

The grocery contest ran from Sept. 7 to Nov. 1 in 66 participating stores across Canada. This year's contest had two ways to play: digital scratch and snap to win.

In the digital scratch game, shoppers had to register online, getting them a digital scratch ticket immediately. They could also opt in for emails to receive bonus digital scratches and watch TGP's social media for codes for bonus scratches. With digital codes, shoppers either got an instant win or an entry into a draw for a daily \$50 gift card.

In the snap to win game, shoppers

had the chance to get bigger prizes. The digital sweepstakes had shoppers register online and receive an instant win or have their name entered five, 10 or 25 times for the \$50 gift card.

Throughout the game period, each time a registered customer spent more than \$30 at a participating TGP store, they could upload their receipt online for five additional entries. Shoppers also got an additional entry every time they bought a qualifying item instore. Customers could also send an envelope with their contact information to TGP for five additional entries.

Along with the gift cards (56 of them to be awarded), all digital sweepstakes entries gave the customer a chance to also win a 2024 Ski-Doo Expedition LE or \$25,000 cash, one of four free groceries for a year and one of 66 shopping sprees (one in each store).

A'Bear doesn't typically do all her grocery shopping at the TGP in Teulon, but during the contest, she did. She registered on the website, bought additional qualifying food items and watched social media for bonus prize codes, trying to get any extra entries

in that she could.

## **RCMP** offer tips to prevent property crime

Most property crimes can be prevented, and local RCMP hope everyone will take steps to protect their homes and businesses.

Stonewall-Headingley RCMP Staff-Sgt. Jason Vrooman encourages everyone to adopt best practices, such as making sure their property is secure and well lit.

"I realize that property crimes are a huge issue in the area. We're hoping to remind community members to make sure that all their property is secure as best they can," he said.

"We should all band together and do the best we can to prevent the crime initially. If you notice any suspicious activity, report it immediately to the police."

To help protect your home, make sure outside doors and walkways have a bright working light or motion sensor lights. Gates should close tightly with a secure latch or lock.

It's best to keep shrubs and bushes trimmed so they can't provide a hiding place. It's also helpful to display yard and window decals for a home security company. A Beware of Dog sign can be posted — even if there's no dog at your home.

Outdoor valuables such as lawn mowers, bikes, snowblowers and barbecues should be locked up.

You might also consider installing a security alarm system with glassbreak detectors and motion detectors.

It's a good idea to store valuables in a home safe or safety deposit box. If you have firearms, they should be stored in a locked safe with trigger locks. Keep an inventory of personal property as well as serial numbers for valuables.

To reduce the chance of identity theft, shred any unwanted documents that contain personal information.

All doors and windows should have working locks. Window screens should be in good working condition, and anti-smash security film can be added to windows. Sliding doors should have a pin to secure them, and all doors and door frames should be reinforced. Doors should also have a peephole or doorbell camera.

If you're travelling, make sure somebody clears the snow and picks up your mail. In warmer weather, make sure somebody mows your lawn when you're away. Neighbours should watch out for each others' homes.

It's also helpful to establish and practise an emergency escape plan in case of a break-in or other emergency.

For businesses, many of the safety tips are similar. In addition to the precautions you would take to secure your home, businesses should also make sure all safes and cash registers are moved off the site after hours. Alternatively, leave them open and empty each night. All valuables should be moved from view when the business is closed, and lights should be left on inside. Motion lights can be installed in the back areas of the business, and interior closed circuit video cameras can be used to capture images for at least seven days.

The phone number for the local RCMP detachment should be posted and easily available for employees, and valuables should be kept behind the counter.

Spare keys to offices, cash registers and safes should be removed from the site at the end of each business day. Make sure to record the serial numbers for valuable items like TVs, computers and any other special equipment.

It's also worth incorporating an endof-day basic safety routine to check windows and doors and to ensure lights are on, the CCTV is working and valuables are removed from sight.

By taking these steps, you might be able to prevent a property crime from happening.

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### **Regional Health Authority bolsters staffing across Interlake**

New hires to combat emergency department closures

As emergency departments in the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority (IERHA) remain understaffed, they continue to be closed.

For the first two weeks of November, only two of IERHA's 10 hospitals had their emergency department open 24 hours a day, seven days a week: Gimli Community Health Centre-Johnson Memorial Hospital and Selkirk Regional Health Centre.

From Nov. 1 to 15, Lakeshore General Hospital's emergency department was closed Nov. 9 and 10 and was only available during the day on Nov. 1. E M Crowe Memorial Hospital in Eriksdale had its emergency department open Nov. 6 and 9, while Arborg and District Health Centre was only able to offer emergency services during the day on Nov. 6, 9 and 13.

Stonewall & District Health Centre's emergency department was closed Nov. 3 and 6 and only offered services during the day on Nov. 2, 8, 10 and 15. Pine Falls Health Complex's emergency department was only open on Nov. 15 for the entire day; Pinawa Hospital's was open for half of the two-week period; Beausejour District Hospital was open during the day for 13 days of the 15, being closed for one entire day and open for one. Teulon's Hunter Memorial Hospital's emergency department was closed for the entirety of Nov. 1 to 15.

A representative from IERHA attributes the emergency department closures to staffing issues — there simply aren't enough medical professionals working in the region.

"New health-care staff members are starting to arrive in Manitoba from the recent Philippines recruitment mission," they said.

In June of this year, the provincial government announced more than 300 health-care workers from the Philippines accepted jobs in Manitoba. They're expected to take jobs in 31 communities in the province.

IERHA said access to primary care will reduce pressure on the emergency departments in the region — the family medicine physician residency program has seen six graduates since it started in 2019, with most remaining in the region to practice.

"We have been successful in retaining two nurses who worked in the region and who secured further training to become nurse practitioners," said the IERHA representative.

Nurse practitioners diagnose and treat illnesses, order and interpret tests, prescribe medications and perform medical procedures.

IERHA said its new recruits are expanding care delivery into the Eriksdale and Ashern regions, with one more nurse practitioner adding care to the Fisher Branch area in early 2024. IERHA has also created a nurse practitioner float pool that has casual staff to bridge gaps in the primary care sector.

IERHA works closely with education institutions as well, said the representative, and they currently offer the following training opportunities closer to home:

- Health-care aide
- Licensed practical nursing
- Medical laboratory assistant
- Operating room assistant

Medical device reprocessing IERHA has developed micro-credential health-care aide training, which has seen four graduates in Fisher Branch, eight in Seymourville and eight in Selkirk. The health authority said most of these graduates have accepted positions within the region.

"We are investing in hosting learners as part of efforts to recruit and retain staff," said IERHA. "Students have been hosted all over the region to complete practicum training."

As substance use treatment is also a rising concern in the province, IERHA has opened two new medical withdrawal management beds at Lakeshore General Hospital for residents from across IERHA to access. There, people can receive treatment from a physician, nurse, addiction nurse, social worker, peer counsellor and an Indigenous elder or knowledge keeper for the first time, allowing people to heal physically and traditionally.

The addition of 12 beds at Lakeshore General Hospital is progressing, along with the addition of seven beds in their emergency department. That will give the hospital a total of 26 beds and 13 treatment sites. It's expected they'll be available in 2025.

At Selkirk Regional Health Centre, a 30 inpatient bed unit is being constructed along with the addition of three new emergency department treatment spots, making for a total of 17. These new areas should also be done in 2025.

"In 2022, we collected and donated 614 items, which were distributed through the Cheer Board," Ransom said.


"We are happy to accept handmade items as well as store-bought new items for donation."

Indigenous youth have the chance to apply for a specialized RCMP pre-cadet training program and learn about potential career opportunities.

All First Nations, Inuit and Métis youth aged 19 to 29 are invited to apply for the Indigenous Pre-Cadet Training Program.

Through this program, participating Indigenous candidates can experience a modified three-week RCMP training experience at the Regina-based training academy.

During this training, participants will learn skills to help them prepare to apply to become a police officer. Af-

ter the program, they'll receive ongoing support and guidance as they go through the application process.

"It gives Indigenous youth the opportunity to experience a training session and a first-hand view of what a possible career in police work might entail," said Cpl. Maureen Greyeyes-Brant, a graduate of the program

who is now the national co-ordinator. Candidates must be Canadian citizens of First Nations, Inuit or Métis descent who have a Canadian high school diploma or equivalent. To be considered for the program, they will also need to pass an enhanced reliability security check and they must be in good physical condition.

The RCMP will cover the costs for all successful candidates, including their travel, meals and accommodations.



## Sold-out SWDPC gala raises awareness about Nav-CARE

Community members helped a local non-profit organization reach for the stars at its much-anticipated annual gala fundraiser.

On Saturday, Nov. 18, supporters gathered at the Stonewall legion for "Reach for the Stars," the semi-formal dinner and dance fundraiser for South West District Palliative Care.

Numbers are still being crunched for the fundraising totals, but it's clear to see the online 50/50 draw was a huge success. The total of the pot rang in at \$5,850, with half (\$2,925) going to lucky winner Anne Kroeker of Teulon. South West District Palliative Care receives the other half.

The progressive auction raised \$4,000, while the live auction led by Ralph Eichler brought in another \$1,950. A bag auction raised another \$2,784.

The fun-filled evening also featured a delicious dinner and dessert prepared and served by volunteers.

Board chair Sandra Smith served as master of ceremonies, introducing community leaders.

Newly minted Lakeside MLA Trevor King encouraged attendees to contribute to the cause.

"We all have been touched one way or another by someone who has had some type of an illness. If you haven't experienced that, I hate to tell you, one day you will," he said. "Thank you all for being here to support such a great cause."

Municipal leaders shared greetings, including Rockwood Reeve Wes Taplin, Stonewall Deputy Mayor Peter Bullivant, Rosser Deputy Reeve Lee Garfinkel, Woodlands Reeve Doug Oliver and Teulon Mayor Todd Campbell.

Mona Buors, minister of Métis Child and Family Services from the National Red River Métis government, also addressed the crowd, sharing an emotional account of losing her brother-in-law earlier this month.

"Palliative care hits everybody," she said. "We don't know when, but we also know that it happens to old people, middle-aged people and, the saddest part, it has to hit children sometimes too." Representing South West District Palliative Care, dynamic trio Doris Hunter, Betty Taylor and Jen Beirnes provided an update on the

organization's activities. Last year, they

sent out a survey to see if people in the catchment area would benefit from Nav-CARE, a free service that stands for "Navigation, Connecting, Advocating, Resourcing, Engaging." The South West District Palliative Care board sponsors and supports the Nav-CARE program.

The response was an overwhelming "yes," with many respondents indicating they would also be interested in volunteering for the program.

The program covers the areas of Rockwood, Woodlands, Rosser, St. Laurent, Armstrong, Stonewall and Teulon to offer support to anyone who is facing loneliness, has chronic conditions or is experiencing declining health. These individuals receive consistent visits from a dedicated volunteer, as well as assistance in finding recourses for individual needs.

"The South West District Palliative Care board recognized the need for more support in our area and launched the Nav-CARE program. We applied for the Nav-CARE grant and were informed in March that 14 applications were received across Canada and that we were one of five applicants who were successful in receiving the Nav-CARE grant for \$60,000. We are the first Nav-CARE program in Manitoba," Hunter said.

"This grant would be given over two years in quarterly increments to be used to pay for the salary of a volunteer co-ordinator. However, to receive this money, there was certain criteria to be met. That criteria includes having two satellite sites, the hub being South West District Palliative Care's catchment area. Second, hiring a volunteer co-ordinator. Third, recruiting volunteers. Fourth, having client re-

ferrals."

To meet the criteria, they met with and provided Nav-CARE information to Teulon Seniors Resource, St. Laurent Seniors Resource and Stonewall Lions Manor.

"Following these presentations, we decided the two satellites would be St. Laurent and Lions Manor," Taylor added.

"In March, we advertised and were successful in hiring a volunteer co-ordinator. The volunteer co-ordinator has a responsibility of looking after volunteers and clients — and going out there and trying to get more."

Gwen Sharp, Nav-CARE volunteer co-ordinator, introduced herself to the attentive audience.

"Nav-CARE has kicked off and we're in full swing. We're accepting clients and volunteers. As of yesterday, we have 12 clients and five referrals that are pending. We have 18 trained volunteers and several are in the midst of doing training online. Training has been offered in person, in a classroom workshop-type setting and also online at your own pace," she said.

"Our outreach is ramping up to build our services. You'll begin to see

new posters and flyers around town that look a little different than the materials that came out in spring."

The next step is to train more volunteers and gain more clients.

"The good news is clients aren't only limited to older adults. It affects every age group. And neither do our clients have to be in a palliative situation. There's more to it than just those that are in palliative care," she said.

"If they have a palliative condition or they're lonely or they're in need of a bit of a social interaction, that's where we come in."

She invited anyone interested in volunteering or referring a client to

A Stonewall girl is forging forward after receiving a second round of stem cell therapy.

In 2020, Amaya Dawson was in a car accident that damaged her spinal cord and left her paralyzed from the chest down. She was seven years old at the time.

Two years ago, she travelled to Thailand for stem cell treatment at Verita Neuro in Bangkok since the procedure currently isn't available in Canada. The hope is that she will regain some sensation through the treatment.

On Oct. 1, 11-year-old Amaya and her mom Alycia travelled to Verita Neuro's sister facility in Guadalajara, Mexico, for a second round of stem cell therapy plus a week of physiotherapy.

On Day 1, Amaya had a physio session in the morning followed by a stem cell infusion in the afternoon.

"She had vitamins and electrolytes by intravenous. Then she got stem cells through an IV and she also got a lumbar injection. Because of her scoliosis, they ended up having to poke her in the back about six times before they were able to successfully get it in," said Alycia, adding that Amaya got a second round of stem cells later in the week.

"At physio, they ended up getting her into standing, which was amazing. Amaya was over-the-moon excited."

Unfortunately, during that first physio session, the experts discovered a problem with her left knee.

"They thought she possibly had stretched or broken tendons. Because of that finding, physio had to change

dramatically since they didn't want to make anything worse. She did lots of muscle stimulation where they would put electrodes on her thighs, calf muscles and feet to make those muscles move. When they do that, it's like running a marathon," Alycia said.

running a marathon," Alycia said. "She quite enjoyed it and she fell asleep most of the time. She was exhausted afterwards from having those muscles work that much. But the muscles reacted, which is great. That was awesome for her to do."

Throughout her week at the Mexican facility, Amaya underwent 15 one-hour physiotherapy sessions before returning home on Oct. 8. Amaya joined her Grade 6 class at Ecole Stonewall Centennial School for a couple days so she could see her friends and get in a good mindset before venturing to the Children's Hos-

pital to have her knee examined.

After they got to the hospital, the doctor found that Amaya actually had a broken tibia, which is the third broken bone in her legs in one year. Since then, she has been in a full-leg cast while the bone heals.

"It had nothing to do with her tendons whatsoever. The bone underneath her calf completely snapped. Amaya doesn't feel the pain, but she gets something else called autonomic



a Blue Christmas."

There will be raffle tickets sold for a Winnipeg Jets



dyslexia symptoms, which is where your body is trying to tell you that something's wrong," Alycia said.

"A week after we got home, she was starting to get lots of those symptoms where she was sweating and getting a fever and feeling unwell. We found out it's because she actually had a broken leg. As soon as she got that cast on her leg, all of those symptoms went away. She's my fragile little butterfly."

Amaya has been seeing an endo-

crinology to find out about a potential treatment to strengthen her bone density.

While she heals, they'll also be watching for any changes that might result from her recent stem cell treatment. About six weeks after her previous treatment in Thailand, she started to have more response in her legs, so they know it might take a little time to see any impacts.

Looking ahead, the family is already planning for Amaya's next round of stem cell treatment, as long as she is eligible.

"Amaya can keep going to get stem cells as long as she keeps getting progress from them. We're going to start saving again now. We give reports every month to her doctor in Thailand," Alycia said.

"Around the five-month mark, he'll let us know if she's eligible again or not. She will go as many times as she possibly can."

They'll likely wait until the new

year to embark on their next fundraising efforts, with a few plans already in the works.

Alycia also expressed gratitude for the community's support and generosity throughout this entire experience.

"If it wasn't for the community, we wouldn't have been able to go again when we did," she said.

"Thanks to everyone in the community from me and Amaya and our family for helping us get there."

## **Teulon-Rockwood fire chief Trombo resigns**

The Town of Teulon accepted the resignation of Fire Chief Ryan Trombo effective Dec. 31, 2023. Trombo will remain a member of the Teulon-Rockwood Fire Department. Effective Jan. 1, 2024, Scott Skinner will take over the role of fire chief.

The Town of Teulon will extend the services of Napier Emergency Consulting to provide emergency consulting services and municipal emergency co-ordination services from Jan. 1, 2024, to Dec. 31, 2024, for \$5,000 plus GST.

Council will also extend the review of wastewater rates for the Teulon Wastewater Utility to Jan. 31, 2024, to allow for the inclusion of data from the full year of tipping fee revenue. Way to Go Consulting is authorized to perform the study.

The committee of the whole meeting scheduled for Nov. 29 was changed to Nov. 22, as council will attend the 2023 AMM Fall Convention on the same day.

In addition, the committee of the whole meeting scheduled for Dec. 27 has been cancelled.

## Local author makes the longlist for the CBC 2023 Nonfiction Prize

### Taylor Arnt gets work recognized on national stage

An author from St. Andrews has made it on the CBC 2023 Nonfiction Prize longlist setting themselves apart on a national level.

"I wrote a piece called The monarch and the matriarch. My short-form description of it is that it's an intergenerational exploration of matriarchy," said Arnt.

Arnt writes under the penname Tay Aly Jade and a full version of the submission is available on their blog.

"My mom gave me a pair of Monarch butterfly earrings last year before beginning graduate school and she wrote a letter with it, explaining that the monarch butterfly goes on this amazing journey. It spans from Canada to Mexico. Along this journey are multiple generations of Monarch butterflies, who passed away along the way. But the fourth generation, that is the super generation and is the one that makes the last leg of the journey," said Arnt.

After the initial inspiration from their mother, Arnt learned more about the monarch butterfly and felt a connection between it and their own family's experience. "[My writing] goes back and forth between metaphors around the monarch butterfly, but also telling the story of both sides of my ancestors. How my European ancestry got to Canada, but also my Anishinaabe ancestry that's been here since time immemorial, and talking about how these two worlds came together," they said.

Arnt says that they felt a calling to write from a young age.

"I remember being at St. Andrew's school in fifth grade, and we had a short story writing assignment and that was my most favourite assignment ever in class. I wrote this gender-bending fairy tale. I was very feminist. And then, in high school, I took on this big project. It was a journal that I wrote all about my experience of being 17 years old at that time. I was able to be very, open and honest and raw, in sharing the experience of what it was like to be a teenager going to the Comp. Then I put it away but it was always kind of there in the background," said Arnt.

They picked writing back up in university, however, and have continued to write.

Arnt thought that submitting work

to the CBC 2023 Nonfiction Prize was a long shot but thought they would try anyway.

"I really loved the piece that I had written, I think it was one of the best pieces that I'd written up to that point. And, I knew it was a really important story, one that needed to be told, because I don't think there are enough stories about mixed people, people who grapple with what it means to be Indigenous and White, or other ethnicities. And so, I think my story really is emblematic of the Canadian multicultural experience," said Arnt.

Though they are still at the beginning of their writing career they've already achieved a lot with this submission and plan to continue to write.

"Next year, I'm planning to write my first book, it's already in the works. But I would love to get that out into the world. I think within the next couple of years, people can expect to see that on bookshelves and be able to buy it and support me as an author," said Arnt.

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



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
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
