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Memory trees at Stonewall and Teulon libraries, tips for dealing with grief

The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority's palliative care program is providing people with an opportunity to mourn the loss of their loved ones through holiday memory trees that have been set up in public places, health facilities and online.

Barb Ramsay, a palliative care volunteer co-ordinator with the IERHA, said having support systems and the chance to honour loved ones at this time of year can help people deal with grief.

"We have all experienced loss and grief to some degree. Some have experienced the death of a loved one and are bereaved," said Ramsay in a statement shared by the health authority. "Support systems and ways to honour are more important than ever."

The palliative care program, with assistance from companion volunteers, community groups and other IERHA staff, has placed trees at the Stonewall library and at the Teulon library where people can place card ornaments on the trees in memory of their loved one. Grief resources for all ages will also be placed at each tree.

During the holiday season when so

much focus is on family, Ramsay said it can be difficult for people who are grieving to feel like celebrating.

"These [memory trees] are meaningful gestures, which are so important around any special day when our sorrow is heightened," she said.

The health authority is also providing people with an opportunity to submit an online memory, which will be posted on the virtual memory tree webpage.

The IERHA is sharing a number of supportive ways people can help themselves during the holiday season. The palliative care program recognizes that this is a difficult time of year and that the absence of loved ones can be more noticeable or painful for many people.

"We all have expectations about what the holidays should be like and how we should feel. We also know that a death in the family changes many things, and this holiday season will be different from others in the past," states the care program.

The palliative care team has put to-

gether the following list of suggestions (with reference to the Victoria Hospice Society) to help people cope with grief:

- As much as we'd like to skip from November to January, this isn't possible. It will be more helpful for you to take control of the situation and plan for what you do and do not want to do to get through this time.
- Family get-togethers may be difficult. It is often helpful to be honest with each other about your feelings, to sit down and decide what you all want to do. Try not to set expectations too high for yourself or other family members on special days.
- Be careful of "should." It is better to do what feels best for you and your family, not what you or others think you should do. Give yourself permission to not do things. Once you have decided how your family will handle the holidays, let others know. Remember, what you choose to do this time can always be changed next year.
- Recognize that your distress about the holidays is normal. It doesn't make you a bad person. Other bereaved people have felt, and do feel, as you do right now.

- Recognize, too, that you can be happy and express joy. This does not mean that you are dishonouring the person who has died.

Rockwood council news in brief

A Rockwood resident is requesting conditional use approval to operate a home industry for reconditioning and minor repair of vehicles, which would be sold off-site from the Road 78N property.

The 46.91-acre property has an existing single-family home, accessory building and farmland. The proposed business would take place in an existing 2,400-square-foot accessory building on the property. Any vehicles being worked on would be kept in the shop, and there would be no outdoor vehicle storage.

The business would operate part-

time, with the shop being used an estimated two days or less per week. The applicant estimates the business would sell between zero and six vehicles per month.

South Interlake Planning District didn't have any significant concerns with the proposed home industry and recommended conditional approval.

IN OTHER COUNCIL NEWS:

- Rockwood council received a request to vary the minimum front yard setback to authorize the construction of an 850-square-foot secondary suite within a principal dwelling at a property on Highway 7 near Teulon.

The applicant would like the minimum front yard to be 95 feet compared the required 125 feet for the 40-acre property, which is in the agricultural general zone.

The South Interlake Planning District had no significant concerns with the proposed secondary suite within a principal dwelling.

Council received a request to authorize an agri-tourism business on Road 75N. In April 2020, South Interlake Planning District received information about an unauthorized business operating on the property.

Due to the pandemic, SIPD paused numerous enforcement files, including this one, although correspondence was exchanged with the prop-

that you enjoy and look for alternatives for those you don't. This year you could buy baked goods, let others bake for you or do without.

- Be aware of the pressures, demands and fatigue that come with the holidays. Take time out to care for yourself. You will need all your energy during this time.
- Be gentle with yourself. Tears and sadness are normal and do not have to ruin the entire holiday for you or for others. Let yourself cry and you will be surprised that you can go on
- As the holiday approaches, it may be helpful to share your concerns, feelings and worries with someone. Try to accept their offers of help.
- Do something symbolic. Think about including rituals that can symbolize your memory of your loved one. For example, putting up a special ornament, lighting a candle or setting aside a special time to remember your loved one. Watch for Memory Trees or memorial events offered in your community. Rituals allow you to direct your feelings and thoughts into an activity. They can make your feelings more manageable.
- You may find yourself reminiscing about other holidays you shared with your deceased loved one. This is normal. Let the memories come. Talk about them. This is part of mourning and doesn't stop just because it is a holiday.
- Consider doing something for someone else. Although you may feel hurt, reaching out to another can bring you fulfillment.

Manitoba Shared Health also provides information about dealing with grief through the "Navigating feelings of grief during the holiday season" posting on its website (sharedhealthmb.ca). Selkirk Mental Health nurse educator Mallory Schmitz offers

a number of suggestions that include acknowledging your feelings as you enter the season, being honest about what you need if you feel a gathering will be difficult, setting limits (e.g., declining invitations) if you're feeling overwhelmed and taking time out for vourself.

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

Woodlands council news in brief

The RM of Woodlands has realized the response and repair costs for the 2023 spring flood, which had minimal impact. The flooding occurred in localized spots throughout the municipality and had a few roads wash out, which required gravel to fix. The total cost of the gravel was \$4,693.28. The RM requested to participate in the provincial government's Disaster Financial Assistance (DFA) Program to assist with the costs. As the total financial impact was so low, the RM was not eligible to claim the costs through DFA as it did not meet the program's deductible, which has to be surpassed if an RM is eligible to claim any of its disaster expenses. The RM's deductible for 2023 was \$13,357. On behalf of its residents and property owners, the RM has sent in a request in the event residents and property owners incurred financial costs related to the spring flood. This resolution allows ratepayers impacted by the 2023 flooding to apply through the provincial DFA program to help with the costs. For more information on the program, visit Disaster Financial Assistance | Manitoba Emergency Management Organization (gov.mb.ca).

Coun. Bryan Myskiw submitted a notice of motion for council to review and reverse the decision to apply for Phase 2 of the LUD boundary expansion. This was to be reviewed at the committee of the whole meeting on Dec. 19, and the motion was to be brought back to the table at the special meeting, which has been called for the same day.

In other council news:

- Council approved Manitoba Hydro's proposed gas works expansion for Rock Lake Hutterite Colony. The colony submitted a private application to Hydro for a natural gas service. The RM is not involved in the contract, except that the natural gas lines are installed in the municipal right-of-way (in the ditch). The colony is responsible for the cost.
- Council authorized a ¼-page ad to be placed in the 2024 Interlake Travel Guide for \$400 plus taxes.
- Council authorized the addition of utility accounts receivables to the tax roll. Every year, outstanding utility balances are added to the tax roll. This means that unpaid utility amounts become owing with municipal taxes the following year and can be collect-

ed in the same manner as taxes.

- Council accepted the tender from Kyle and Kelley Sigurdson for cleaning the RM office, public works shop in Woodlands and the multi-purpose building in Warren. This was an existing cleaning contract that council decided to renew. The contract will be accounted for in the 2024 budget. The rate for the service is unchanged at \$45 per hour, which includes insurance, travel and most cleaning supplies. The cleaning schedule depends on the building — either weekly, monthly or seasonally. So far in 2023, the RM has spent \$5,701.50 on cleaning services, with a couple more invoices expected before the end of the year.
- The RM authorized Catalis Technologies Canada Ltd. to update the RM website to be accessibility compliant for \$1,000. The upgrades required by the Accessibility of Manitobans Act include excluding non-functional icons/spacers from assistive technology, providing descriptions and tagging for background images acting as standard images, consistent hierarchy with titles and tagging elements with button functionality for assistive technology. The money is expensed under website maintenance/upgrades.

erty owners between 2021 and 2022.

The landowners didn't apply for the required conditional use, and in 2023 they indicated that they would be selling the property.

Now the new landowners are seeking conditional use approval for the agri-tourism business, which would include a U-pick berry farm and weekly farmers' markets in the summer, as well as other seasonal events such as a fall fair and sleigh rides.

The new owners might also consider

adding other events such as a petting farm, pony rides and music and craft evenings.

The South Interlake Planning District recommended approval with conditions.

- Starting Jan. 1, the Winfield transfer station and the Teulon-Rockwood waste disposal grounds will only accept debit cards but not cash.

Punch cards will also be available for purchase at the RM of Rockwood office and the Town of Teulon office for \$30 each, made up of 10 spots for \$3 incre-

ments per card.

God is not dead, nor does He sleep

Recently I came across the background to the writing of one of my favorite Christmas carols: "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day." On July 9, 1861, Fanny Longfellow had her dress catch on fire. Hearing her screams, her husband, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, came and desperately tried to put out the fire and save his wife. Sadly, he was unsuccessful and Fanny died the next day. In the process, he was severely burned on his face and hands.

In his diary on Christmas day, 1861, he wrote, "How inexpressibly sad are the holidays." Å year later, on Christmas day, 1862, he wrote, "A 'Merry Christmas' say the children, but that is no more for me." Then in 1863, just before Christmas, his son came home from the Civil War severely wounded. There is no entry in Longfellow's diary for that Christmas.

But on Christmas Day 1864, Longfellow wrote: "I heard the bells on Christmas day their old familiar carols play and wild and sweet the words repeat of peace on earth, good will to men." Because the Civil War was raging at the time, he went on to write, "And in despair I bowed my head: 'There is no peace on earth,' I said, 'For hate is strong and mocks the song of peace on earth, good will to men.'

However, being a strong believer in a God who is sovereign over all events and that even in the worst of times, He is the only One who can give true and perfect peace, he continued writing: "Then peeled the bells more loud and deep; 'God is not dead, nor does He sleep. The wrong shall fail, the right prevail, With peace on earth, good will to men."

Perhaps this Christmas, your world has fallen apart. But I want to remind you: "God is not dead, nor does He sleep." God is very much alive and He will bring to fruition the promise the angels made that first Christmas: "peace on earth, good will to men".

May that be your experience this Christmas.

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Festive tradition continues with ice church

The Rosser United Church continued with their festive tradition of building its annual ice church for everyone to enjoy last Friday.

The holiday tradition started over a decade ago and families and church members have continued to keep it alive.

The purpose of the project is to work together to create something that the church community — and the greater community — can enjoy.

Each year, the Sunday school requests that members of the congregation make ice blocks at home. They can use whatever they want to form the ice blocks, old milk or juice cartons as well as four-litre containers or five-gallon pails.

These larger ice blocks are used for the "foundation" of the ice church. Some families have fun making coloured blocks using food colouring in the water. This year Sunday School teacher Brooke Darragh said they had 11 families including 17 children help with the construction.

Families deliver the ice blocks to the church and on construction day, young and old gather to peel cartons off of ice blocks. Many hands stack blocks on top of the large foundation ice blocks, creating the ice church or wall. Snow is used as mortar and water poured sparingly from watering cans to glue blocks in place.

On Christmas Eve everyone in the congregation is welcome to place a battery-operated tealight in memory or honour of family or friends in the crevasses between blocks of the ice church. Usually someone sets up a flood light behind the ice church to draw the attention of those driving through town.
